RESOLUTIONS

The Commission read three resolutions into the record. The first resolution was presented to **Master Police Officer Darla Portman of the Tampa Police Department**. Ms. Portman served the Commission beginning September 25, 2020 until she retired on April 14, 2023. Through her professional insight, personal dedication, and commitment, Commissioner Portman made significant contributions toward the development and advancement of criminal justice in Florida and has been an invaluable asset in guiding the development of Florida's criminal justice standards and

training programs. The second resolution was presented to the **Colonel Gene Spaulding** of the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicle Division of Florida Highway Patrol. Colonel Spaulding was appointed to serve on the Commission beginning September 21, 2015, to April 5, 2023. Through his professional insight, personal dedication, and commitment, Colonel Spaulding made significant contributions toward the development and advancement of criminal justice in Florida and has been an invaluable asset in guiding the development of Florida's Criminal Justice Standards and Training programs. The third resolution was presented to **Government Operations Consultant III Terri Bremer**. Ms. Bremer has served the Florida Department of Law Enforcement in various positions beginning March 30, 2007, to March 30, 2023. Through her professional insight, personal dedication, and commitment, Ms. Bremer has made significant contributions to the criminal justice community and the citizens of Florida. Her dedication and commitment to service have been an invaluable asset to the Criminal Justice Professionalism Division and the Commission.

RECOMMENDATION: Chairman Ford requested a motion to adopt the resolutions as read into the record.

COMMISSION ACTION: *Commissioner Sewell moved that the Commission adopt the staff's recommendation; seconded by Commissioner Bevan; motion carried.*

TRAINING CENTER DIRECTORS' ASSOCIATION REMARKS

On behalf of TCDA Chairman Jay Romine, Director Rick Davis of the North Florida College Public Safety Academy provided the following report from the May 17, 2023 business meeting.

- **Introduction of New Training Center Directors** – Director Bill Bierbaum of the Department of Financial Services, Division of Investigative & Forensic Services Training Center and Colonel Jeremy Small of Escambia County Sheriff's Office Training Academy.
- **Annual Elections** – Chair Romine was re-elected as Chair of the Training Center Directors Association; Director Sandy Hotwagner was re-elected as Treasurer, and Director Theresa Garcia was re-elected South Chair.
- **Coordinators Workshop** – The second annual coordinators workshop, will be held in September 2023 and more details will be forthcoming. Director Davis stated coordinators should take advantage of this opportunity to learn more about networking and operations in running training centers..
- **Perfect Audits** – Director Davis also expressed how proud he was of the 16 perfect audits that were presented at the TCDA Business Meeting on May 17, 2023.

AGENDA ITEM 1: CRIMINAL JUSTICE PROFESSIONALISM UPDATES

Director Felipe Williams of the Criminal Justice Professionalism (CJP) Division reported the following:

Legislative Updates:

- **House Bill 543: Public Safety** — requires each law enforcement agency to create and maintain an active assailant response policy which includes annual training. FDLE is required to post a Marjory Stoneman Douglas (MSD) High School Public Safety Commission-Active Assailant Model Policy to the public website, which is currently active. Each agency must provide written certification to FDLE by October 1, 2023. Director Williams stated approximately 10% of certifications have been submitted as of May 18, 2023.
- **Senate Bill 7064: Human Trafficking** — enhances criminal penalties when it comes to certain offenses. This bill authorizes judicial circuits to establish educational programs for persons convicted or charged with certain violations and creates a Statewide Data Repository for Anonymous Human Trafficking. Director Williams stated the legislature recognized that human trafficking training is part of basic recruit training and it removes the

requirement that officers complete training within 1 year of beginning their employment.

- **House Bill 1285: Florida State Guard** — requires Florida Guard to establish a specialized unit. The members of the specialized unit must meet the minimum requirements of Chapter 943, F.S.; and be certified law enforcement officers. Director Williams also stated this bill will grant arrest authority in the jurisdiction where the specialized unit law enforcement officers are activated and deployed.
- **House Bill 425: Transportation** — revision designates railroad police as law enforcement officers who fall under the auspice of Chapter 943, F.S.; and are also governed by the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission (CJSTC).
- **House Bill 657: Enforcement of School Zone Speed Limits** — specifies that any penalties assessed and collected should be deposited to various trust funds including \$3 into the CJST Trust Fund.
- **House Bill 95: Rights of Law Enforcement Officers and Correctional Officers** — states that an officer may not be discharged, suspended, or demoted solely based on their names being placed on a Brady list. However, this does not prohibit any employing agency from further disciplinary action against an officer based on underlying actions that put the officer on the Brady list.
- **House Bill 535: Funeral Service Benefits for Public Safety Officers** — authorizes travel expenses for members of law enforcement agencies for specified purposes; increases money paid toward funeral and burial expenses for officers killed in the line of duty. It also authorizes the use of state motor vehicles to attend funerals.

CJST Trust Fund Revenue Report: Director Williams updated the Commission that the CJST Trust Fund has received 6.57 million in revenue which represents a 1.6 percent increase compared to 2022, and it also reflects a 1.7 percent decrease compared to pre-Covid. He also stated the revenue is moving in the right direction.

COMMISSION ACTION: This agenda item did not require Commission action.

AGENDA ITEM 2A: CRIMINAL JUSTICE STANDARDS AND TRAINING TRUST FUND AUDIT RECOMMENDATIONS: REGIONS I, II, IV, VI, IX, XIV, AND XV FOR FISCAL YEAR 2021 – 2022

Bureau Chief Glen Hopkins presented this agenda item and provided the trust fund revenue recommendations.

1. Section 943.25(4), F.S., requires that the Commission establish, implement, supervise, and evaluate the expenditures of the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Trust Fund for Commission-approved advanced and specialized training program courses.
2. Rule 11B-18.010, F.A.C., requires that the Commission audit any training facility or program and fiscal agent's accounting records and procedures for compliance with laws, rules, budget provisions, and contractual agreements.

AGENDA ITEM 2B: CRIMINAL JUSTICE STANDARDS AND TRAINING TRUST FUND OFFICER TRAINING MONIES: FISCAL YEAR 2023 – 2024 OPERATING BUDGET REQUESTS

Bureau Chief Glen Hopkins presented this agenda item and provided the trust fund operating budget recommendations.

1. Section 11B-18.0052, F.A.C., requires the Criminal Justice Professionalism Division to notify the Regional Training Councils of the projected allocation of officer training monies by July 1 of each year.
2. The proposed distribution of the **\$6,098,160.00** allocation is determined by the total regional officer count of **76,227** at the rate of **\$80.00** per officer. Each Commission-certified criminal justice training school submits a budget request to their Regional Training Council for approval and the Regional Chairpersons forward the respective region's budget(s) to Commission staff for review and approval.
3. Operating Budget Requests.
 - A. All budgets shall comply with the following Officer Training Monies Expenditure Formula:
 - Administrative Category - No more than 5%
 - Training Category - No less than 80%
 - Operating Capital Outlay Category - No more than 15%
 - B. Details for the Fiscal Year **2023 – 2024** Operating Budget Requests begin on **page 2**. These budgets have been reviewed and approved by Commission staff.

AGENDA ITEM 3: **2022 CRIMINAL JUSTICE AGENCY PROFILE (CJAP) REPORT**

Bureau Chief Glen Hopkins presented this agenda item to the Commission because Section 943.18, F.S., requires that the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission, "...make a comprehensive study of the compensation and benefits paid to law enforcement and correctional officers throughout the state..." to include factors upon which compensation is based. This report is intended for use by law enforcement and correctional agencies, as well as local and state governments, as a tool to evaluate the sufficiency of compensation paid to criminal justice personnel throughout Florida.

1. The 2022 CJAP Report contains information on officer demographics, compensation, benefits, training programs, and specialized units. The report is available on the FDLE internet site (www.fdle.state.fl.us). From the home page select "Quick Links". The Criminal Justice Agency Profile Report appears alphabetically in the links listed under 'Criminal Justice Professionalism Division'.
2. The 2022 CJAP Report is separated by disciplines for a comparison of compensation and benefits of responding agencies. The data was collected from surveys distributed to the agency heads of all state, county, and city law enforcement and correctional agencies, and is based on the minimum compensation for entry-level officers.
3. A list of the survey data elements collected and reported in the 2022 CJAP Report was provided on page 2.

RECOMMENDATION: Commission staff requested that the Commission review and approve the 2022 CJAP Report. The 2022 CJAP survey results will be placed on the FDLE website and available to criminal justice agencies and the public.

COMMISSION ACTION: *Commissioner Nebbeling moved that the Commission adopt staff's recommendation; seconded by Commissioner Sewell; motion carried.*

AGENDA ITEM 4: **FLORIDA CRIMINAL JUSTICE EXECUTIVE INSTITUTE POLICY BOARD MEMBERSHIP REAPPOINTMENTS**

Bureau Chief Chris Johnson presented this agenda item to the Commission to request approval for the reappointment of Chief Tracy Frazzano to the Florida Criminal Justice Executive Institute Policy Board.

1. Section 943.1755(3), F.S., requires that "an individual shall be nominated by the entities and shall become members of the board upon approval of the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission. Members appointed under this paragraph shall serve a 2-year term.
2. President Keith Touchberry of the Florida Police Chiefs Association has made the following recommendation to the Florida Criminal Justice Executive Institute Policy Board (FCJEI Policy Board): **a)** the reappointment of Chief Tracy Frazzano of the Marco Island Police Department.

RECOMMENDATION: Commission staff recommended the Commission adopt the Florida Police Chiefs Association recommendation to reappoint Chief Tracy Frazzano, effective May 18, 2023, to the FCJEI Policy Board.

COMMISSION ACTION: *Commissioner Pearson moved that the Commission adopt staff's recommendation; seconded by Commissioner Sewell; motion carried.*

AGENDA ITEM 5A: OFFICER TRAINING: SPECIALIZED TRAINING PROGRAM – Retirement of Specialized Course 2007, Safe Handling of Firearms

Bureau Chief Ashley Pennington presented this agenda item to the Commission to retire Specialized Course 2007, Safe Handling of Firearms:

1. The Commission is responsible for maintaining specialized training program courses for Commission-certified law enforcement, correctional, and correctional probation officers. Courses in the Specialized Training Program may be delivered using Criminal Justice Standards and Training Officer Training Trust Fund Monies.
2. Commission staff developed the 16-hour Specialized Course, 2007, Safe Handling of Firearms to fulfill the training need of Correctional Probation Officers (CPOs) at a time when those officers were not required to complete the 80-hour Firearms for Criminal Justice Officers training program.
3. Since CPOs are now required to complete the 80-hour Firearms for Criminal Justice Officers training program and no other schools use this course, the Specialized Course, 2007, Safe Handling of Firearms is no longer needed.

RECOMMENDATION: Commission staff recommended the Commission retire Specialized Course, 2007, Safe Handling of Firearms with an effective date of May 18, 2023.

COMMISSION ACTION: *Commissioner Riedl moved that the Commission adopt Commission staff's recommendation; seconded by Commissioner Sewell; motion carried.*

AGENDA ITEM 5B: OFFICER TRAINING: SPECIALIZED TRAINING PROGRAM; APPROVAL OF THE SPECIALIZED COURSE #1422, MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLNESS FOR CRIMINAL JUSTICE OFFICERS

Bureau Chief Ashley Pennington presented this agenda item to the Commission to request approval of the new Specialized Course, #1422, Mental Health and Wellness for Criminal Justice Officers.

1. The Commission is responsible for maintaining specialized training program courses for Commission-certified law enforcement, correctional, and correctional probation officers. Courses in the Specialized Training Program may be delivered using Criminal Justice Standards and Training Officer Training Trust Fund Monies.
2. The 2022 Florida Legislature passed House Bill 3, creating s. 943.1745, Florida Statutes, which directs the Commission to establish required instruction on health and wellness principles for each law enforcement officer as part of their 40 hours of required training for continued employment. To comply with statute, Commission staff consulted with the Florida State University Institute for Justice Research and Development, and the Resiliency Behind the Badge training program to develop the training component relating to officer health and wellness principles. The training must include but not be limited to four specific objectives outlined in the bill.
3. Commission staff worked with subject matter experts from law enforcement and corrections to develop this new 2-hour mandatory online training, Specialized Course, #1422, Mental Health and Wellness for Criminal Justice Officers. The course provides instruction on understanding the role secondary trauma and work-related incidents have on the personal life of an officer, methods for identifying and addressing personal and work-related stressors, strategies to better understand when to seek professional help and what kind of help to seek, and strategies to normalize conversations about stress, trauma, and mental health within the law enforcement community.
4. Each law enforcement officer must complete this training every four years as part of the 40 hours of instruction for continued employment or appointment as an officer.

RECOMMENDATION: Commission staff recommended the Commission the new 2-hour Specialized Course #1422, Mental Health and Wellness for Criminal Justice Officers in the Specialized Training Program with an effective date of May 18, 2023.

2) Bureau Chief Glen Hopkins reported that the workshops on Commission rules, specifically records and officer discipline rules, will recommence between July and September of 2023. FDLE staff will reach out to the training centers to assist with meeting spaces and secure dates.

3) Bureau Chief Glen Hopkins also provided an update on the 2022-2023 Commission rules package that was submitted to the cabinet aides on May 17, 2023, in advance of the cabinet meeting on May 23, 2023. The package included rules regulating firearms rewrite for basic recruit training that goes into effect July 1, 2023. A tech memo will be released outlining those changes.

The 2023-2024 rules package was provided to the training center directors. The package includes the changes to the contraband statutes from the 2019-2020 legislative session that the Penalty Guidelines Taskforce voted on in January 2023. The rules package also includes the retirement of the Safe Handling of Firearms course and the in-service Firearms Rewrite requirement that goes into effect on July 1, 2024.

In conclusion, staff does not anticipate having the Rules Package Workshop in August. The Rules package will be given to the Commission prior to the August CJSTC meeting and any questions will be discussed during the Commission Business Meeting on August 9th.

2. Three sheriffs nominated by the Florida Sheriffs Association.
3. A county jail administrator nominated by the Florida Sheriffs Association and the Florida Association of Counties.
4. A representative nominated by the State Law Enforcement Chiefs Association.

(4) The policy board shall establish administrative procedures and operational guidelines necessary to ensure that criminal justice executive training needs are identified and met through the delivery of quality instruction.

(5) Members of the policy board are entitled to reimbursement for per diem and travel expenses pursuant to s. [112.061](#) to the extent such expenses are associated with meetings or training activities, appropriate to the Department of Law Enforcement, and deemed necessary by the board.

(6) Seven members constitute a quorum of the board.

Courses in the Advanced Training Program may be delivered using Criminal Justice Standards and Training Officer Training Trust Fund monies.
2. In 2021, the Training Center Director's Association and members with the Florida Association of Hostage Negotiators (FAHN) recommended that Commission staff examine the 40-hour Advanced Course, #093, Hostage Negotiation (V2011.07) for outdated material and a possible revision.
3. Commission staff worked with members of FAHN and other subject matter experts to examine the current course version for outdated material. Upon review, the workgroup agreed the course needed a complete overhaul to accurately reflect the current job description, duties, and best practices of a negotiator.
4. The new 40-hour Advanced Course, #1424, Hostage and Crisis Negotiations focuses more on barricaded subjects in crisis and less on hostage takers since most situations involving the deployment of a negotiation team involve the former. In addition to updated content and terminology, there is more emphasis on the history of negotiations, subject motivators, negotiation skills and risk assessment, incident resolution, in-class activities, and role-play scenarios.
5. This course will replace the current 40-hour Advanced Course, #093, Hostage Negotiation.

RECOMMENDATION(S): Commission staff recommends the Commission approve the new 40-hour Advanced Course, #1424, Hostage and Crisis Negotiations in the Advanced Training Program with an effective date of August 10, 2023.

ISSUE

This agenda item is presented to the Commission to request approval of the new Specialized Course, #1421, Recognize and Respond to Mental Health and Substance Abuse Emergencies.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1. The Commission is responsible for maintaining specialized training program courses for Commission-certified law enforcement, correctional, and correctional probation officers. Courses in the Specialized Training Program may be delivered using Criminal Justice Standards and Training Officer Training Trust Fund monies.
2. The 2021 Florida Legislature passed House Bill 7051, creating s. 943.1735, F.S. It directs the Commission to "establish standards for instruction of officers in the subject of use of force" for basic recruit training courses. In response, staff reviewed current basic recruit courses and supplemented 2022 materials as needed. Staff then sought input from agencies on whether there was a need for post-basic training on these same use of force subjects and found that there was.
3. The second course to be developed under s. 943.1735, F.S. is the 8-hour Specialized Course, #1421, Recognize and Respond to Mental Health and Substance Abuse Emergencies. Commission staff worked with members of the Florida Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) coalition to develop this course for current law enforcement officers. This one-day course provides instruction on the recognition of the evident symptoms and characteristics of an individual with a substance abuse disorder or a mental illness, and appropriate responses to an individual exhibiting such symptoms and characteristics.

RECOMMENDATION(S): Commission staff recommends the Commission approve the new 8-hour Specialized Course, #1421, Recognize and Respond to Mental Health and Substance Abuse Emergencies in the Specialized Training Program with an effective date of August 10, 2023.

VOTING IMPACT

CONSEQUENCES OF A "YES" VOTE ON STAFF RECOMMENDATION: A "yes" vote shall make available the officer training on recognizing and responding to mental health and substance abuse emergencies.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1. On July 5, 2023, Captain Michael Bond, Criminal Justice Academy Director for Lake Technical College, submitted a petition for rule waiver of Rule 11B-35.0024, F.A.C. on behalf of Jonathan Rohena Rivera.
2. Petitioner wishes to waive that portion of the rule that states: (1) Student Performance in Commission-approved High-Liability Basic Recruit Training Courses, Instructor Training Courses, and Specialized and Advanced Training Program Courses Requiring Proficiency Demonstration. Petitioner wishes to waive the portion of Rule 11B-35.0024(1), F.A.C., that states: (1) Students enrolled in a Commission-approved Basic Recruit Training Program, Instructor Training Courses, or Specialized or Advanced Training Course shall qualify through demonstration of proficiency skills(s) in the applicable course(s) and pass a written end-of-course exam, pursuant to Rule 11B-35.0024, F.A.C.
3. Petitioner states that an audit revealed that the academy was missing documentation, CJSTC Form 6, Defensive Tactics Performance Evaluation. When this was discovered, the academy had Mr. Rivera return on June 2, 2023. At that time, he was re-evaluated for defensive tactics and the form was completed for the file.

RECOMMENDATION(S): Commission staff recommends that the Commission GRANT the petition for a permanent waiver of Rule 11B-35.0024(1), F.A.C.

(1) Students enrolled in a Commission-approved Basic Recruit Training Program, Instructor Training Courses, or Specialized or Advanced Training Course shall qualify through demonstration of proficiency skill(s) in the applicable course(s) and pass a written end-of-course examination.

For purposes of this section, “substantial hardship” means a demonstrated economic, technological, legal, or other type of hardship to the person requesting the variance or waiver. For purposes of this section, “principles of fairness” are violated when the literal application of a rule affects a particular person in a manner significantly different from the way it affects other similarly situated persons who are subject to the rule.

Petitioner requests a wavier for the following rule:

11B-35.0024 Student Performance in Commission-approved High-Liability Basic Recruit Training Courses, Instructor Courses, and Specialized and Advanced Training Program Courses Requiring Proficiency Demonstration.

(1) Student enrolled in a Commission-approved Basic Recruit Training Program, Instructor Training Course, or Specialized or Advanced Training Course shall qualify through demonstration of proficiency skill(s) in the applicable course(s) and pass pass a written examination.

Requested Action:

The Petitioner requests a **permanent waiver** or variance for the High-Liability Proficiency requirement, rule 11B-35.0024(1), F.A.C, due to substantial hardship and principles of fairness.



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Reason for Requested Waiver:

The Petitioner is requesting the waiver on behalf of Mr. Jonathan Rohena Rivera, who recently completed the required Basic Recruit Training Program for Law Enforcement on April 18, 2022. The Petitioner sets forth his statement of facts that a clerical oversight has led to Mr. Rohena Rivera not having a CJSTC 6 form, Defensive Tactics Performance Evaluation in his student file.

Mr. Rohena Rivera attended Basic Law Enforcement class 15-20-2010-02 at Lake Technical College, satisfying all State requirements to sit the State Officer Certification Exam. He passed the exam on May 12, 2022 and has been employed by the Lake County Sheriff's Office and the Lady Lake Police Department.

On June 21, 2023, while conducting an audit on class 15-20-2010-02, it was discovered that CJSTC 6 form, Defensive Tactics Performance Evaluation, was missing from the class file for Mr. Jonathon Rohena Rivera. As this was the only form missing, College Staff looked through other class files as it may have been placed in another class, yet it yielded negative results. As of this waiver request, the paperwork has not been found.

College attendance records showed that he attended all hours for the Defensive Tactics block of instruction, to include being exposed to chemical agent (see attachment). Mr. Rohena Rivera sat for the end of chapter written exam and had a passing score of 88% (see attachment). Additionally, the Lead Defensive Tactics Instructor completed a statement verifying the facts of this waiver request. On June 23, 2023, Mr. Rohena Rivera came back to the college and was retested for the Defensive Tactics Performance Evaluation where he demonstrated 100% proficiency (see attachment).

The petitioner thus states that having Mr. Rohena Rivera retake the entire Defensive Tactics block of instruction would create hardship due to the time and cost involved. Further, the Petitioner submits that on the principle of fairness, due to a clerical error on the part of the College Staff, Mr. Rohena Rivera should not be penalized as he completed the entire block of instruction with a passing score.

Why waiver requested would serve the purposes of the underlying statute

The underlying waiver or variance of rule 11B-35.0024(1) has been satisfied and serves the purpose of the statute in that all basic recruits pass Defensive Tactics High-Liability block of



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instructions to be eligible to sit the State Officer Certification Exam and become a certified law enforcement officer. The Petitioner believes Mr. Rohena Rivera completed the required hours and passing scores on both the practical and written portions of the block of instruction and additionally was retested on the proficiency portion of Defensive Tactics Performance Evaluation and passed. To this, the Petitioner requests a permanent waiver from the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission for rule 11b-35.0024(1).

Petitioner wishes to waive that portion of the rule that states: (2) The following individuals are eligible to take the State Officer Certification Examination (SOCE) for the requested criminal justice discipline: (a) Individuals who, within four years of beginning basic recruit training, have successfully completed a Commission-approved Basic Recruit Training Program, pursuant to rule 11B-35.002, F.A.C.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1. **FY 2023 – 2024 Quarterly Trust Fund Activity.** Since the May Commission meeting, the trust fund analysts have initiated extensive audits of trust fund expenditures, class records, and instructor records for FY 2021-2022 and 2022-2023. Trust fund warrants for the first quarter of FY 2023–2024 have been forwarded to the regions' fiscal agents for disbursement to the training schools.
2. **Budget Amendments/Programmatic Changes.** Rule 11B-18.0071(2)(b), F.A.C., requires training schools and regions to obtain approval from Commission staff prior to the transfer of Officer Training Monies between budget categories. These budget amendments do not alter the Commission's approved trust fund expenditure formula. Commission staff has approved Budget Amendments and/or Programmatic Changes for the following:

 - A. Commission staff shall request, and be granted appropriate authority from the State Comptroller.
 - B. Regional Training Councils shall submit to Commission staff for approval, a separate operating budget for accrued interest.
 - C. Expenditure of accrued interest is restricted to training costs and purchase of operating capital outlay items.
 - D. The interest shall be expended on or before June 30 of the subsequent year in which it is earned.

Note: There are no interest budgets for August 2023.

- 4. Property Disposals.** Commission staff has approved the removal of equipment items from the trust fund inventory of Region IV (North Florida College), Region V (Northeast Florida Criminal Justice Center) and Region XVI (Department of Corrections). General Information Agenda Item: Curriculum Updates Pursuant to Section 943.17, F.S.

ISSUE

This agenda item is presented to the Commission in compliance with the statutory requirement for staff to advise the Commission of any revision to approved basic recruit, advanced, and specialized curricula.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1. Pursuant to Section 943.17, F.S., the Commission is responsible for the development and maintenance of basic recruit, advanced, and specialized training programs for Florida law enforcement, correctional, and correctional probation officers. Section 943.17(3), F.S. provides that the program is responsible for the accuracy of curriculum content through the identification and revision of typographical or grammatical errors, incorrect statutory citations, or information which can be identified as inaccurate by superior references. The statute states that the Commission shall be advised of any revision, and a copy of revised curricula shall be provided to all criminal justice training schools.
2. Curriculum alerts were created in an ongoing effort to ensure that Florida officers receive accurate and up-to-date information in curricula approved by the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission. Curriculum alerts document revisions to approved curricula that are considered critical in nature. Revisions come from several sources, including subject matter experts, instructors, officers, agencies, and superior references such as the Legislature and a court of jurisdiction. Curriculum alerts are distributed to training schools and posted on the FDLE website and the Automated Training Management System.
3. To further formalize and document revisions to the Commission's approved curricula under s. 943.17(3), F.S., an issue is included in each quarterly meeting packet to identify the Commission courses that have been revised within the previous quarter.
4. The curriculum changes that are reflective of "legislative action" only will be included in this agenda item. Impacted course curricula will be distributed to the training schools and certified instructors with other Commission-approved curriculum updates.

Lawful Uses of Weapons and Firearms

The state of Florida recognizes 17 lawful categories of people who may own, possess, and use firearms and other weapons for lawful purposes. The categories are listed in the following table:

Lawful Ownership, Possession, and Use of Firearms and Other Weapons (s. 790.25, F.S.)	
1	Members of the U.S. armed forces and Florida National Guard when on duty, training or preparing themselves for military duty, or subject to recall or mobilization

5	Officers or employees of the state or United States duly authorized to carry a concealed weapon

8	A person engaged in fishing, camping, or lawful hunting or going to or returning from a fishing, camping, or lawful hunting expedition
9	A person engaged in the business of manufacturing, repairing, or dealing in firearms, or the agent or representative of any such person while engaged in the lawful course of such business
10	A person firing weapons for testing or target practice under safe conditions and in a safe place not prohibited by law or going to or from such place
11	A person firing weapons in a safe and secure indoor range for testing and target practice
12	A person traveling by private conveyance when the weapon is securely encased or in a public conveyance when the weapon is securely encased and not in the person's manual possession, <u>or an authorized CWL holder or a person who meets unlicensed concealed carry requirements</u>
13	A person while carrying a pistol unloaded and in a secure wrapper, concealed or otherwise, from the place of purchase to his or her home or place of business or to a place of repair or back to their home or place of business



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14	A person possessing arms at their home or place of business
15	Investigators employed by the several public defenders of the state, while actually carrying out official duties
16	Investigators employed by the Capital Collateral Regional Counsel, while actually carrying out official duties

Concealed Weapons and Firearms

Except for the lawful uses listed above in s. 790.25 F.S., Florida is not an open carry state. Throughout the United States, open carry refers to the practice of “openly carrying a firearm in public.” However, concealed carry is where firearms cannot be seen by the casual observer. Florida law ~~requires~~ previously required a person to obtain a concealed weapon or firearm license (CWFL) to carry a concealed weapon or firearm. However, effective July 1, 2023, Florida allows the carry of a concealed weapon or concealed firearm if certain conditions are met. The firearm or weapon must be concealed from the ordinary sight of another person, such as in a hidden holster on the body or in a bag, purse, or backpack. A brief, unintentional open display of a firearm by a person authorized to carry a concealed firearm, with or without a license, is not an open carry violation.

Although a licensed individual, and unlicensed individuals that meet the criteria, may carry a concealed weapon or firearm, there are certain places where an individual is not authorized to carry a concealed weapon or firearm, even with a license. The table below specifies the places where possession is not allowed by either licensed or unlicensed individuals:

Possession Restrictions for Concealed Weapons or Firearms (s. 790.06 (12)(a), F.S.)	
1	Any place of nuisance as defined in s. 823.05, F.S.



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2	Any police, sheriff, or highway patrol station
3	Any detention facility, prison, or jail
4	Any courthouse
5	Any courtroom, except that nothing in this section would preclude a judge from carrying a concealed weapon or determining who will carry a concealed weapon in his or her courtroom
6	Any polling place
7	Any meeting of the governing body of a county, public school district, municipality, or special district
8	Any meeting of the Legislature or a committee thereof
9	Any school, college, or professional athletic event not related to firearms
10	Any elementary or secondary school facility or administration building
11	Any career center
12	Any portion of an establishment licensed to dispense alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises, which portion of the establishment is primarily devoted to such purpose
13	Any college or university facility unless the licensee is a registered student, employee, or faculty member of such college or university and the weapon is a stun gun or nonlethal electric weapon or device designed solely for defensive purposes and the weapon does not fire a dart or projectile
14	The inside of the passenger terminal and sterile area of any airport, provided that no person shall be prohibited from carrying any legal firearm into the terminal, which firearm is encased for shipment for purposes of checking such firearm as baggage to be lawfully transported on any aircraft
15	Any place where the carrying of firearms is prohibited by federal law



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Stops and Concealed Weapons

There may be times when you stop someone who is legally carrying a weapon or firearm. The Florida Statutes allow anyone to carry a weapon or firearm on their person or in their vehicle without a concealed weapon license, as long as the weapon is securely encased, not readily accessible for immediate use, and possessed for a lawful purpose as defined in chapter 790.

The Florida Statutes define “readily accessible for immediate use” as carried on the person or within such close proximity and in such a manner that it can be retrieved and used as easily and quickly as if carried on the person. “Securely encased” means in a glove compartment, whether or not locked; snapped in a holster, not attached to the person; in a gun case, whether or not locked; in a zippered gun case; or in a closed box or container which requires a lid or cover to be opened for access.

Concealed license holders are allowed to carry a concealed weapon or firearm on their person in a vehicle. When you stop them, many people who carry a CWFL will tell you that they have a weapon on their person or in their vehicle and that they have a license to carry it. They are not required to tell you that they have either a license or a weapon. However, they must carry the license, together with valid identification, at all times when they are in actual possession of a concealed weapon or firearm, and they must display both the license and proper identification upon demand by a law enforcement officer. Under the new law effective July 1, 2023, persons 21 years or older who meet the criteria for unlicensed carry can also have a concealed weapon or firearm on their person while in a motor vehicle. However, persons 18–20 years of age must have the firearm securely encased or not readily accessible for immediate use.

Any person who carries a concealed weapon or firearm without a license must also carry valid identification at all times when they are in actual possession and must display the identification upon demand by a law enforcement officer. A violation of the identification provision is a non-criminal violation punishable by a \$25 fine.

Agency computer devices may give you access to the Florida Crime Information Center database (FCIC) to verify the license, or you might have to verify the information with dispatch. You will learn more about FCIC in Chapter 5.

Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act

The Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act is a federal law that allows qualified and retired law enforcement officers to carry a concealed firearm in any jurisdiction in the United States, regardless of state or local laws. To comply with the Act officers must carry two forms of documentation:



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- photo identification issued by the agency for which they are currently employed or were separated from
- documentation which certifies that the officer has met, within the past 12 months, the active duty law enforcement standards for qualification for a firearm of the same type as the one they are carrying

Reciprocity With a License

A law enforcement officer may come in contact with individuals from other states who are in possession of a concealed weapon or firearm. The Florida Statutes allow officers in Florida to recognize concealed weapons licenses issued by ~~another~~ any other state ~~if the other state agrees to recognize Florida concealed weapon licenses~~. This principle is known as reciprocity.

Florida has reciprocity recognition agreements with many states, but not all. A CWFL issued to residents of these states is valid in Florida. However, some states issue concealed carry licenses to individuals who are not residents of the issuing state. These non-resident licenses are not honored under Florida's reciprocity provision. To determine Florida's reciprocal agreements, review the list of states on the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services website. This list is regularly updated and provides the most accurate information on reciprocity. However, the non-resident may still be allowed to carry a concealed weapon or firearm in Florida without a license.

Reciprocity Without a License

A non-resident of Florida may carry a concealed weapon or firearm while in Florida if they are a resident of the United States, age 21 or older (unless a service member or honorably discharged veteran F.S. § 250.01 age 18-20), and are not prevented by Florida law to possess them for any other reason.

AL 224.7. Describe the basic legal requirements for a person to carry a concealed weapon or firearm.

Lawful Ownership and Possession of Weapons and Firearms

Chapter 790 of the Florida Statutes addresses lawful ownership, possession, and use of firearms and weapons. In the state of Florida, a person younger than 21 may not purchase or transfer ownership of a firearm from a licensed importer, manufacturer, or dealer (s. 790.065(13), F.S.). As a result, a licensed importer, manufacturer, or dealer may not make or facilitate the sale or transfer of a firearm to a person younger than 21. These prohibitions do not apply to the purchase of a rifle or shotgun by a law enforcement officer, correctional officer, or a military service member. However, a person younger than 21 can still own or possess a firearm in accordance with chapter 790. For example, a person younger than 21 may own or possess a firearm that has been given to them as a gift, or obtained by other lawful means. A person younger than 21 can



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also buy a firearm from a private party; however, it would be a criminal offense for a person to sell or otherwise provide a firearm to someone younger than 18 if it is sold or provided without consent from the minor’s parent or guardian.

In addition to sales of firearms, the Florida Statutes address seizing firearms in situations where a person poses a danger to themselves or others. Section 394.463, F.S., authorizes a law enforcement officer who is taking someone into custody for an involuntary examination under the Baker Act to seize and hold any firearm or ammunition the person possesses if the person poses a danger to themselves or to others and has made a credible threat of violence against another person. You will learn more about the Baker Act in Chapter 6.

Lawful Uses of Weapons and Firearms

The state of Florida recognizes 17 lawful categories of people who may own, possess, and use firearms and other weapons for lawful purposes. The categories are listed in the following table:

<u>Lawful Ownership, Possession, and Use of Firearms and Other Weapons (s. 790.25, F.S.)</u>	
<u>1</u>	<u>Members of the U.S. armed forces and Florida National Guard when on duty, training or preparing themselves for military duty, or subject to recall or mobilization</u>
<u>2</u>	<u>Citizens of this state subject to duty in the armed forces under s. 2, Art. X of the State Constitution, under chapters 250 and 251, and under federal laws, when on duty or when training or preparing themselves for military duty</u>
<u>3</u>	<u>Persons carrying out or training for emergency management duties under chapter 252</u>
<u>4</u>	<u>Sheriffs, marshals, prison or jail wardens, police officers, Florida highway patrol officers, game wardens, revenue officers, forest officials, special officers appointed under the provisions of chapter 354, and other peace and law enforcement officers and their deputies and assistants and full-time paid peace officers of other states and of the federal government who are carrying out official duties while in this state</u>
<u>5</u>	<u>Officers or employees of the state or United States duly authorized to carry a concealed weapon</u>
<u>6</u>	<u>Guards or messengers of common carriers, express companies, armored car carriers, mail carriers, banks, and other financial institutions, while actually employed in and about the</u>



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	<u>shipment, transportation, or delivery of any money, treasure, bullion, bonds, or other thing of value within this state</u>
7	<u>Regularly enrolled members of any organization duly authorized to purchase or receive weapons from the United States or from this state, or regularly enrolled members of clubs organized for target, skeet, or trap shooting, while at or going to or from shooting practice; or regularly enrolled members of clubs organized for modern or antique firearms collecting, while such members are at or going to or from their collectors' gun shows, conventions, or exhibits</u>
8	<u>A person engaged in fishing, camping, or lawful hunting or going to or returning from a fishing, camping, or lawful hunting expedition</u>
9	<u>A person engaged in the business of manufacturing, repairing, or dealing in firearms, or the agent or representative of any such person while engaged in the lawful course of such business</u>
10	<u>A person firing weapons for testing or target practice under safe conditions and in a safe place not prohibited by law or going to or from such place</u>
11	<u>A person firing weapons in a safe and secure indoor range for testing and target practice</u>

Criminal Justice Standards and Training Trust Fund Revenue Report for Fiscal Year 2023 – 2024

ISSUE

This agenda item provides information to the Commission about Criminal Justice Standards and Training Trust Fund revenues, officer training disbursements, and the trust fund cash balance for Fiscal Year 2023 – 2024.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1. For the Fiscal Year 2023 – 2024, the Legislature allotted the Criminal Justice Professionalism Division **\$17.9 million** between general revenue and the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Trust Fund. The trust fund is only providing salary dollars for staff. All other expenditures are from general revenue.
2. The operating budget for officer training in Fiscal Year 2023 – 2024 totals **\$6,098,160**, which provides **\$80** for each of the state's 76,227 officers. Disbursements for the first quarter of the fiscal year will be **\$1,524,540**.
3. The beginning cash balance in the trust fund on July 1, 2023 was **\$6,125,653**.
