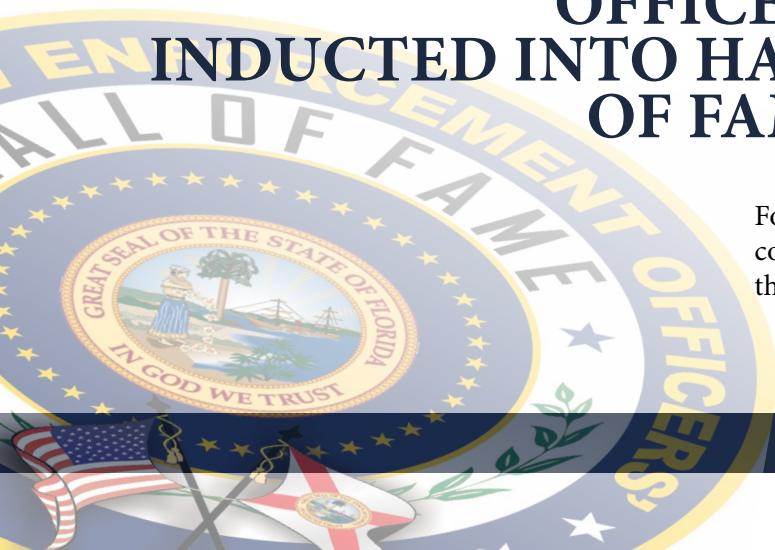


## FIVE LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS INDUCTED INTO HALL OF FAME

Current and former law enforcement officers from throughout Florida were honored Saturday, June 3, 2023, at the Florida Law Enforcement Officers' Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony. FDLE Commissioner Mark Glass presided over the ceremony.

The inductees were nominated by the Florida Sheriffs Association, Florida Police Chiefs Association, Police Benevolent Association, Fraternal Order of Police and the State Law Enforcement Chiefs' Association.

Following the nominations, inductees were then selected by a committee. Governor Ron DeSantis and Florida's Cabinet approved the 2023 inductees on January 17, 2023.

# FIVE LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS INDUCTED INTO HALL OF FAME



**John E. Brooks**

Sunrise Police Department  
Nominated by Florida Police Chiefs  
Association

**John E. Brooks** began his 43-year career in law enforcement in 1975 as a patrol officer for the Miami Police Department. Over the next 25 years he would progress through the ranks of the department before retiring in 2000 as an assistant chief of police. Chief Brooks attended the FBI National Academy and served in the Air Force Reserves. Shortly after retiring from the Miami Police Department, Chief Brooks joined the Broward County Sheriff's Office (BSO) as a captain where, in 2001, he became intricately involved in all aspects of combating terrorism and became BSO's liaison to the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) directly after the 9/11 attacks. In 2005, Chief Brooks was promoted to major and assigned to the new Division of County and Domestic Security, where he commanded three districts and a complement of over 500 sworn and civilian personnel with a budget totaling \$38 million. While in this position, he was the agency's representative to the FBI Joint Terrorism Task Force and was awarded one of the highest clearances with the United States government. In 2007, after being promoted to the rank of lieutenant colonel for BSO, Chief Brooks was appointed chief of police for Sunrise Police Department, becoming the seventh police chief in Sunrise history. He remained the chief of Sunrise Police Department until his retirement in January 2018.



**Gary W. Hester**

Winter Haven Police Department  
Nominated by the Florida Sheriff's  
Association

**Gary W. Hester** began his 35-year career in law enforcement in 1979 with the Polk County Sheriff's Office, where he served in detention, patrol, criminal investigations and special investigations. He was one of the first K-9 handlers in the agency and lead pivotal investigations in both narcotics and vice. Chief Hester was a pioneer in the use of analytical proactive policing and problem-solving models. He was integral in developing and spearheading the agency's Proactive Community Attack on Problems (PROCAP), which led to dramatic decreases in crime from the late 1990s to the present. Chief Hester was instrumental in the development of the agency's strategic planning processes that are committed to continuous improvement and staff development. He is a published author in the Journal of Criminal Justice. His leadership extended well beyond the Polk County Sheriff's Office, as he served as police chief for the cities of Winter Haven and Haines City, and as the deputy county manager for public safety for Polk County. He also served as president of the Polk County Police Chiefs Association and chaired the Florida Police Chiefs Association Legislative Committee, leading lobbying efforts on behalf of law enforcement statewide. He was active in his church and civic associations, including Rotary, Polk Vision, Leadership Polk, and in coaching youth sports.



**Douglas F. Muldoon**  
Palm Bay Police Department  
Nominated by the Florida Police  
Chiefs Association

**Douglas F. Muldoon** started his police career in 1976 with the Palm Bay Police Department. On April 23, 1987, a lone gunman went on a rampage killing 6 people, including 2 police officers, and wounded 14 others. Chief Muldoon, a captain at the time, was tasked with setting up a command post and coordinating a response of several hundred police officers responding from the entire state, in what was to be a seven-hour standoff. After this horrific event, he helped to prepare other police departments on how to better handle similar events. Chief Muldoon remained with Palm Bay, and continued his ascension within the department, holding the ranks of major and deputy chief before being named chief of police in April 2011. Chief Muldoon distinguished himself in Florida law enforcement when he was elected president of the FBI National Academy Associates (FBINAA). He also serves as the chair of the FBINAA Charitable Foundation, co-chair of Survive First and committee chair for the Florida Police Chiefs Association Public Private Security Partnership. He has consistently embraced and excelled in the various leadership roles that he has fulfilled throughout his career. Chief Muldoon is well-respected and actively involved in improving the quality of life for the community at large and the law enforcement professionals he has served.



**Anthony L. Peterson**  
St. Petersburg Police Department  
Nominated by the Florida Police  
Benevolent Association

**Anthony L. Peterson** was with St. Petersburg Police Department for almost 30 years, where he served in patrol, vice and narcotics, gang intelligence, Special Investigations Unit (SIU) and training. Detective Peterson has demonstrated exceptional bravery throughout his career and has handled extremely dangerous situations while under great duress. He utilizes sound judgement and appropriate techniques to take control of any situation, while upholding the law and mentoring the agency's newest officers. During his service with the SIU, Detective Peterson was shot two times, once in 2008 and again in 2020. Despite these obstacles, he remained with the unit, acting as lead detective on some of SIU's largest and most in-depth investigations. For his actions in the line of duty, he has twice been awarded both the Purple Heart and the Medal of Valor. In 2017, he was the recipient of the Ned March/Bud Purdy Award of Excellence and, in 2020 Detective Anthony was named the St. Petersburg Police Department Officer of the Year. On March 2, 2021, he was recognized as the first ever Law Enforcement Officer of the Day on the Florida State House floor by Speaker of the House Chris Sprowls and Attorney General Ashley Moody. Although he retired from law enforcement in 2022, he continues to serve as a background investigator with the St. Petersburg Police Department.





**Dorene E. Thomas**  
Pinellas Park Police Department  
Nominated by the Florida Police  
Chiefs Association

**Dorene E. Thomas** began her law enforcement career in 1974 at St. Pete Beach Police Department as a police intern and was later hired as a parking enforcement officer. After moving to the Pinellas Park Police Department as its first female officer in 1980, she was appointed chief in 2000. She retired in 2015, but continues to serve as a reserve officer. Chief Thomas embraced building relationships between the agency's employees and command staff while keeping her community and its citizens first. During her tenure, she was credited with shepherding Pinellas Park Police Department through years of agency turmoil and turbulent budget woes; leveraging emerging technology that improved officer safety and agency responsiveness to its citizens; and building a new intelligence-led policing initiative. Chief Thomas led the Pinellas Park Police Department with style and a commitment to the law enforcement profession that permeated all levels of the agency and its leadership. She was selected as the 1991 Sailor of the Year while serving in the United States Naval Reserve and retired from the Navy Reserves in 2003 as chief yeoman. She has also served as president of the Tampa Bay Area Police Chiefs Association and the Florida Police Chiefs Association (FPCA), recognized for the FPCA Wall of Honor, and named National Alliance on Mental Illness Officer of the Year, International Crisis Intervention Team Chief of the Year and Police Officer of the Year. She completed her MPA at Golden Gate University and Ph.D. at Northcentral University.



The Florida Law Enforcement Officers' Hall of Fame was created by the 2014 Florida Legislature to recognize and honor law enforcement officers who put their lives on the line for the safety and protection of Florida's citizens and visitors through their works, service and exemplary accomplishments.



# Mental Illness *Awareness*

## **Mandatory Training: Mental Health and Wellness for Criminal Justice Officers**

The 2022 Florida Legislature passed House Bill 3, creating Florida Statute 943.1745. It directs the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission (CJSTC) to work in consultation with the Florida State University (FSU) Institute for Justice Research and Development and the Resiliency Behind the Badge training program to develop training on officer health and wellness principles.

In response, CJSTC staff reviewed current curricula on the topic and sought input from FSU and several subject matter experts (SMEs) from around the state to help develop the course. The training includes but is not limited to:

- understanding the role that secondary trauma and work-related incidents have on the personal life of an officer
- identifying and addressing personal and work-related stressors
- knowing when to seek professional help and what kind of professional help to seek
- normalizing conversations about stress, trauma, and mental health within the law enforcement community

Beginning with the July 1, 2023 mandatory retraining cycle, each law enforcement officer must complete this training every four years as part of the 40 hours of instruction for continued employment as an officer. While this training is recommended for all criminal justice officers, it is not required for corrections or correctional probation officers.

The 2-hour online specialized course, #1422, Mental Health and Wellness for Criminal Justice Officers was approved by the CJSTC on May 18, 2023 and was effective immediately upon approval.

## **Course Retired: Safe Handling of Firearms**

On May 18, 2023, the Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission (CJSTC) approved the retirement of specialized course, #2007, Safe Handling of Firearms.

Commission staff initially developed the course to fulfill the training need of Correctional Probation Officers (CPOs) at a time when those officers were not required to complete the 80-hour Firearms for Criminal Justice Officers training program. Since CPOs are now required to complete the 80-hour Firearms for Criminal Justice officers training program, the specialized course, #2007, Safe Handling of Firearms is no longer needed to fulfill that training need.

# 2023 Training Center Directors Workshop

The 24th Training Center Directors Workshop was held at the Florida Department of Law Enforcement from June 6 through June 9, 2023. A total of 21 people, including six directors, attended the full workshop with others coming in for specific topic areas. The workshop provided a valuable opportunity for new directors to network and to learn some best practices. The attendees received 28 hours of training that may be used towards their instructor retraining requirements.

The workshop was started in 2002 to provide new training center directors and their staff with training on the rules and requirements related to training center certification, staffing, and facilities along with information about officer training, instructor certification, and requirements related to the Standards and Training Trust Fund. To date, a total of 485 directors, coordinators, and fiscal agents have attended a workshop. Over the years, the workshop has evolved based on feedback from the participants to provide the most current and relevant information possible.

# The Florida Legislature passed Senate Bill 7064 relating to **HUMAN TRAFFICKING TRAINING**

The bill amends s. 943.17297, F.S., to incorporate four hours of training in identifying and investigating human trafficking in basic recruit training. This change removes the previous requirement that within one year of employment, all certified law enforcement officers must complete the training. Law enforcement officers who previously completed specialized courses #1407 or #1408, Identify and Investigate Human Trafficking for Law Enforcement Officers, or a law enforcement basic recruit training program that began on or after July 1, 2021, have met this requirement. Officers who complete the equivalency of training (EOT) process for law enforcement must complete this training requirement prior to being eligible for certification. Governor DeSantis signed SB 7064 on May 16, 2023 and the act is effective on July 1, 2023.

The Automated Training Management System (ATMS) will automatically enter the training completion date for those officers who complete basic recruit training. The employing agency will need to enter the training completion date in ATMS for those officers who complete the EOT process. To enter the training completion date, navigate to "Officer Records" on the left side of the ATMS menu. Select "Human Trafficking." Enter the date the officer completed the training and select "Save."

# 30 Analysts Graduate from the Florida Law Enforcement Analyst Academy

The Florida Law Enforcement Analyst Academy is proud to announce the graduation and certification of 30 law enforcement analysts on June 16, 2023. Analysts who attend the academy meet one week a month for six months. Each analyst is challenged with weekly assignments and quizzes, group and individual projects, and a comprehensive final exam. Successful graduates are designated by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) as certified law enforcement analysts.

The Florida Law Enforcement Analyst Academy was developed in 2003 by FDLE to provide analysts with the opportunity to hone their criminal and intelligence analysis skills. The academy's curriculum is continuously updated to ensure that it remains relevant with the ever-changing world of technology, and the academy provides resources and tools to assist the analysts in their mission to predict and prevent criminal activity. With the graduation of this class, 35 academies have been held and 833 analysts have been certified.

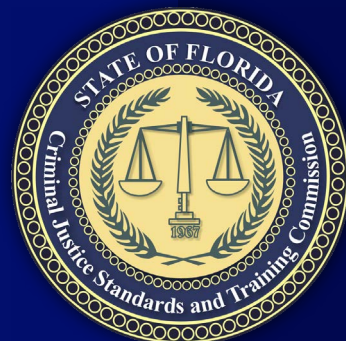


### **Farewell to Commissioner Colonel Spaulding**
