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#### Letter from D.A.R.E Coordinator

On behalf of the Florida Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) Program, I am pleased to announce that 2021 was another amazing year. I am frequently asked if D.A.R.E. is still around and if D.A.R.E. really works. The answer remains a definite "Yes!". The D.A.R.E. program is growing with educational programs on subjects including opioid abuse prevention, vaping and teen suicide. Because of the partnering with educational institutions to adapt the curricula, D.A.R.E. has new enhanced lessons which include bullying, cyber security, a supplemental marijuana lesson, family talks, mental health, celebration of life lessons and the recently launched K-12 Opioid Prescription Drug Abuse Prevention lessons.

With the D.A.R.E. curriculum constantly being updated to address current issues facing our children, it is important that the school resource officers stay well-trained on the updates. We conducted our 85<sup>th</sup> Florida D.A.R.E. Officer Training (DOT) salary incentive certification class this year at the B Ocean Resort Conference Center in Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

This year's training conference had 27 graduating students from the following 12 agencies: Margate Police Department (PD), Doral PD, Marion County Sheriff's Office (SO), Lake County SO, Coral Gables PD, Coconut Creek PD, Ocala PD, Lowndes County (Georgia) SO, Ormond Beach PD, Madison County SO, Key Biscayne PD and Port Orange PD. This year's training team was facilitated by Corporal Ken Vila (Collier County SO), Annette Castor (Collier County SO), Lieutenant Anglie Hightower-Holmes (Gadsden County SO), Deputy Lisa McCumber (Nassau County SO), Deputy Terry Allen (Retired, Lake County SO) and Lieutenant Fred Jones (Lake County SO).

On November 9, 2021, the Florida Sheriffs Association, in partnership with the Florida Sheriffs Institute, hosted a webinar training course titled "The New DARE and 2022 Training Calendar". Presenters were Danny Talley, southeast D.A.R.E. America coordinator, Kim Hawkes central D.A.R.E. America coordinator and FDLE Inspector David Bullard. The training's learning objectives included an overview of the new DARE curricula and programs, core and enhancement lessons and the 2022 Florida DARE officer training calendar. The presenters had the opportunity to answer questions from Florida's sheriffs, police chiefs and command staff. I am pleased to announce that there were 56 webinar participants that day.

As we enter 2022, we are preparing for our next D.A.R.E Officer Training classes this summer in Seminole County, Florida and Broward County, Florida.

Thank you for your ongoing commitment to providing D.A.R.E. training to Florida's youth. This is very much a team effort and we commend you for your exemplary efforts.

### D.A.R.E. Program Overview

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) has been actively involved with the D.A.R.E. program since 1988. It is a statewide diversion and prevention program for drug abuse in juveniles that is administered throughout Florida's schools. The primary role and responsibility of FDLE in the D.A.R.E. program is to serve as the state training coordinator and program administrator. This administration includes preparation and oversight of the budget, training, and certification of officers and preparation of the annual D.A.R.E. report. Additionally, FDLE is responsible for ensuring compliance with national standards, delivery of technical assistance and providing statewide program management.

The D.A.R.E. program was developed and implemented in California in 1983 through the combined efforts of the Los Angeles Police Department and the Los Angeles Unified School District. The initial 17-week curriculum was designed to provide awareness and facts to elementary school students with the intent that this knowledge would help them resist peer pressure to experiment with alcohol and other drugs. Gang and violence prevention strategies were included in that curriculum to provide a more solid foundation for our children. The evaluations of the curriculum for students in grades 6 through 9 show students completing the course experienced a:

- 32 to 44 percent reduction in marijuana, tobacco, and alcohol use,
- 29 to 34 percent decrease in intent to accept substances,
- Reduction and cessation in substance use among those already using.

Although the program has undergone revisions over its 38 years, D.A.R.E. continues to be a law enforcement officer-led series of classroom lessons that teaches children from kindergarten through high school how to make good decisions and wise choices. The curricula cover a wide range of risks, including drug use, that children face daily and encourage them to lead a positive lifestyle. Today, D.A.R.E. is in over 70 percent of school districts nationally, and has been implemented in more than 50 countries. And, according to the U.S. Department of Justice, "the D.A.R.E. program offers students the opportunity to gain a trustworthy adult friend, develop a positive attitude toward law enforcement personnel and acquire greater respect for the law."

D.A.R.E. Class #85 July 12 - 23, 2021 Fort Lauderdale, Florida

D.A.R.E. Class #85 was another successful D.A.R.E. officer training 80-hour salary incentive class stressing the D.A.R.E. mission of "teaching students good decision-making skills to help them lead safe and healthy lives". Its purpose is to fulfill a vision of "a world in which students everywhere are empowered to respect others and choose to lead lives free from violence, substance use and other dangerous behaviors".

Only officers who are carefully vetted by leadership in their community law enforcement agencies are sent to DOT. They are further vetted by the mentors responsible for training new D.A.R.E. officers. Then, D.A.R.E. officers undergo a rigorous 80-hour training course conducted by mentors with a significant number of years of classroom experience as well as university-level educators. All officers are taught to deliver the curricula exactly as they are written, thereby achieving the goal of nearly 100 percent implementation fidelity. Over and above the 80-hours of course instruction, officers also undergo additional hours of practicing the lessons in small groups and in front of the entire group. Throughout the course, officers are assessed for readiness to deliver the curricula.
