3 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Now I'd like to recognize  
4 Commissioner Jerry Bailey to present his agenda.

5 And let me just brag a little about the  
6 Florida Department of Law Enforcement. On Friday I  
7 went down to meet with the sheriff, superintendent  
8 of schools, and the family in Gilchrist. And the  
9 first thing they all did was thank the Florida  
10 Department of Law Enforcement.

11 In these smaller counties, if it wasn't for  
12 the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, we  
13 couldn't get investigations done in a timely  
14 manner, and so they couldn't say enough good things  
15 about you; so thanks for what you do.

16 COMMISSIONER BAILEY: Thank you, Governor, and  
17 good morning.

18 I have two items on your agenda today. First  
19 I'm recommending approval of the minutes from our  
20 June 17 Cabinet meeting.

21 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion to approve?

22 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: So move.

23 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second?

24 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Second.

25 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Moved and seconded, show the

1 minutes approved without objection.

2 COMMISSIONER BAILEY: The second item is our  
3 '13/'14 fiscal year performance report. We had  
4 another successful year. Florida's crime rate  
5 dropped the lowest it's been in 43 years; and it's  
6 not only the rate, we actually had 27,000 fewer  
7 crimes reported in the state during that same time  
8 period.

9 But with that said, Florida's law enforcement  
10 is still responding. We're responding to a violent  
11 crime every six minutes, and we're making an arrest  
12 every 35 seconds. Our laboratories process  
13 75,000 cases, of which 99 percent of those were for  
14 the sheriffs and the police departments in the  
15 state.

16 Our DNA database had 4,400 hits. And just  
17 last month there was a milestone, we entered our  
18 one millionth profile into Florida's DNA database.  
19 And as a challenge to local law enforcement, our  
20 response agencies out there, 56,000 of those  
21 one million are unknowns from crime scenes waiting  
22 to be matched. And in the coming year, you will  
23 see a lot of matches made. That investment is  
24 paying great dividends to our taxpayers.

25 FDLE alone worked 2,200 criminal

1 investigations. Forty percent of those were  
2 violent crimes such as you were talking about  
3 earlier, Governor; and 40 percent were economic  
4 crime and public integrity.

5 Our Capitol police here answered 3,400 calls.  
6 We processed three million background checks and  
7 managed more than 25 million criminal histories in  
8 our database, and that database is growing by 2,400  
9 each and every day in our state.

10 We issued 188 Silver Alerts, 38 Missing  
11 Children Alerts, and seven Amber Alerts. We've  
12 partnered with the Florida Lottery to include the  
13 Silver Alerts on the lottery terminals in our  
14 retail establishments, and those are already  
15 resulting in the return of our endangered elderly.

16 We added 4,000 sexual offenders and predators  
17 to our database. A sad note, we now have 64,000 of  
18 those in Florida's database. But this database was  
19 included last year to include a campus search  
20 function. The public can now search for offenders  
21 and predators who work, live, or attend college  
22 near them or their loved ones.

23 We hold and maintain 83,000 law enforcement  
24 and correctional officers' records. And I'm  
25 pleased to tell you that last year there was a

1 decrease in the number of disciplinary cases that  
2 we had to handle for that group.

3 With that, I would recommend approval of our  
4 '13/'14 annual report.

5 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a motion to accept  
6 the report?

7 ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: Motion to accept.

8 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Is there a second?

9 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Second. Governor, at  
10 the appropriate time, I have a couple of questions.

11 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Why don't you do that now?

12 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Thank you for the  
13 report, Commissioner.

14 COMMISSIONER BAILEY: Yes, sir.

15 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: You continue to bear  
16 good news.

17 On the crime rate, can you please -- the  
18 denominator on that, is that the state's  
19 population, or is that the state's population plus  
20 94 million visitors?

21 COMMISSIONER BAILEY: It's based on the  
22 state's population; it's per hundred thousand. But  
23 a point that I hope I can make is not only the rate  
24 is down but the volume is down.

25 And when you consider the rate, it's our --

1 the actual rate of our residents, that does not  
2 take into account the millions of visitors and  
3 tourists that come into our state this year. So  
4 really it's --

5 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: It's even better.

6 COMMISSIONER BAILEY: -- a lot better than  
7 that rate reflects.

8 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: It's a bigger  
9 denominator in that ratio. So across the board,  
10 you're seeing these decreases, violent crime,  
11 non-violent crime. Are there pockets of the state  
12 that are defying the trend that we need to shine a  
13 light on?

14 COMMISSIONER BAILEY: Well, when you look at  
15 it, in some of the smaller counties, a few crimes  
16 in a particular category can make their rate look  
17 artificially high. But in the populous areas of  
18 our state, Dade, Broward, Palm Beach, Tampa Bay  
19 area, the law enforcement agencies there are  
20 bringing it down and keeping it down in just about  
21 every category.

22 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: And as we continue to  
23 dig into these numbers, are we able to tease out  
24 some of the more influential factors that are  
25 driving this rate down? Is it the decline in drug



1 use? Is it longer prison sentences? Is it stiffer  
2 penalties? Is there a deterrent factor? I mean to  
3 help make better decisions going forward, to keep  
4 this trend going, what are the factors that are the  
5 most contributory to this trend?

6 COMMISSIONER BAILEY: What is contributing I  
7 think most to the downward part of the trend is the  
8 technology and training being held and exercised by  
9 local law enforcement, the sheriffs, and the  
10 chiefs. They're using the databases that are  
11 provided to them; they're using the crime labs. We  
12 have six of them: Dade, Broward, Palm Beach, and  
13 Indian River have their own, Pinellas County have  
14 their own. And the use of that technology and  
15 things like I had pointed out earlier,  
16 Commissioner, where the DNA continues to expand  
17 what we have there, it's putting more people in  
18 jail and it's keeping the worst of the worst in  
19 jail and in prison.

20 Now one thing that it's not -- that we all  
21 thought, and the criminologists thought, that with  
22 the downturn in the economy, that the crime rate  
23 was going to go up; but right in the face of that,  
24 you have seen the crime rate go down over the past  
25 several years of our hurting economy.

1           COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: And is this an overall  
2 national trend, or are we -- is Florida an oasis  
3 relative to the rest of the country in terms of a  
4 declining -- a historically low crime rate?

5           COMMISSIONER BAILEY: We share the trend with  
6 some states, not all states have that. In most  
7 cases, the more populous states, it is on its way  
8 up. The smaller, the more agricultural and rural  
9 states, they're following us and on the way down.

10           We're an oasis in the dynamic states out  
11 there. The states that are experiencing growth, we  
12 have a rate that we can be much more proud of than  
13 those states.

14           GOVERNOR SCOTT: I think what you're also  
15 seeing is that if you talk to the sheriffs,  
16 police chiefs, FDLE, state attorneys, there's a lot  
17 more cooperation here than what you hear in other  
18 places. So I think you hear that all across the  
19 state. There is a high regard for FDLE, but  
20 there's also a high regard for our sheriffs, our  
21 police departments, state attorneys, state attorney  
22 general's office; everybody works together well.

23           Thank you, Commissioner.

24           ATTORNEY GENERAL BONDI: And, Governor,  
25 you know, I just want to stress the importance,

1 especially since we have some lawmakers in the room  
2 today, of that crime lab. I can tell you way  
3 before I was Attorney General -- this isn't like  
4 NCIS where you put a DNA match in a machine and you  
5 have -- you come up with DNA.

6 This is very time consuming; it's very  
7 expensive. It takes very qualified people to  
8 analyze DNA. And I can tell you, there has not  
9 been one time when I was a prosecutor when I didn't  
10 have an emergency, when we had an unsolved  
11 homicide, when we needed DNA, that we didn't call  
12 FDLE and within minutes you started that process.  
13 You stopped everything else you were doing to work  
14 with our sheriffs, our police chiefs, as the  
15 Governor said.

16 But that lab -- and because we're identifying  
17 more predators, that's great news, that's a great  
18 thing. We have more in our database to solve all  
19 these unsolved murders and rapes and cases that are  
20 out there. So that's why the funding of our labs  
21 is so vitally important. Because not only are they  
22 a great investigative agency, all of our sheriffs  
23 and chiefs rely on that lab and that data.

24 COMMISSIONER BAILEY: If I may on DNA, it was  
25 just three short years ago that for a profile to be

1 entered into our database, it had to be upon the  
2 conviction, someone going into the state prison  
3 system. And as you know, a lot can happen between  
4 an arrest and a conviction, whether it's  
5 adjudication withheld or dismissed for a variety of  
6 reasons.

7 But anyway, today, thanks to the legislature  
8 and the support of this body, upon arrest for  
9 certain felonies, just like for a fingerprint, that  
10 profile goes right into the database at that time.  
11 And that's what I'm hoping will match with those  
12 56,000 from crime scenes that we -- that are  
13 unsolved as of today. So DNA is paying great  
14 dividends to the state.

15 GOVERNOR SCOTT: All right. Any other  
16 comments or objections?

17 (NO RESPONSE).

18 GOVERNOR SCOTT: Hearing none, the motion  
19 carries.

## Justifications

<sup>1</sup> **Forensic measures** – During this period, turnaround times increased in some disciplines, mostly due to staffing deficiencies. In order to mitigate this issue, the department is proactively hiring and training new lab personnel and transferring cases between regional labs to increase efficiency and assist with backlog service requests.

<sup>2</sup> **Number of samples added in the DNA Database** – The department enters all samples submitted for the DNA Database. This quarter, fewer submissions were received than anticipated.

<sup>3</sup> **Number of calls for Capitol Police service** – Due to a more proactive patrol approach by officers, the number of calls for service is less than anticipated. Throughout the year, this measure fluctuates depending upon events scheduled at the Capitol.

<sup>4</sup> **Number of registered sexual predators/offenders (total) identified to the public** – This measure reflects a running total of predators and offenders added to the registry. The department anticipates the standard will be met at the end of the fiscal year.

<sup>5</sup> **Number of individuals who pass the basic professional certification examination** – This measure reports the performance results of external individuals taking and passing the examination. During this quarter, fewer individuals took and passed the exam than anticipated.

<sup>6</sup> **Percent of training centers in compliance with established administrative and financial standards** – This measure has three component parts: facility inspections, monitoring of training delivery and perfect financial audits. During this period, several training centers failed to achieve a perfect financial audit, which resulted in performance for this measure falling below the standard.



## Highlights



**Florida's DNA Database reaches one million offender submissions.** In August, FDLE's DNA Database hit the one million mark for offender submissions. A valuable tool for law enforcement, the database provides investigators with hundreds of hits every month, helping to generate leads and solve violent crimes. Since 1990, the DNA Database has grown to be one of the largest in the nation by adding DNA samples on all felony convictions. In 2011, Governor Scott supported and the Florida Legislature funded expansion of samples to include certain felony arrests. Today, DNA is collected from all felony convictions and those arrested for homicide, aggravated assault, sexual battery, lewd and indecent exposure, burglary and robbery. In January 2015, DNA will be collected on those arrested for kidnapping and weapons and firearms violations. Since inception, the database has provided law enforcement with more than 31,200 hits. Florida's DNA Database is part of the FBI's national DNA identification index system known as CODIS.

**Three women arrested in stolen baby formula scheme.** In partnership with the Attorney General's Office of Statewide Prosecution and the Brevard, Orange and Pinellas County Sheriffs' Offices, FDLE arrested three women for the organized retail theft of baby formula. The suspects allegedly operated a business on Craigslist named "Formula Mom" that stole large quantities of baby formula and shipped it to New York, Wisconsin and California for re-sale. The scheme allegedly generated up to \$2 million. Each defendant is facing charges of conspiracy to commit racketeering punishable to 30 years in prison. The Attorney General's Office of Statewide Prosecution is prosecuting this case. The Cape Coral, Casselberry and Ocoee Police Departments also assisted with this case.

**Florida Missing Children's Day.** First Lady Ann Scott joined Commissioner Bailey and hundreds of law enforcement personnel, public officials and citizens for the 2014 Florida Missing Children's Day ceremony in Tallahassee on September 8, 2014. At the event, children participated in a safety presentation on abduction prevention. During a formal ceremony, Commissioner Bailey recognized citizens, canine trailing teams and law enforcement officers for their exemplary efforts in missing children investigations. In 2013, approximately 35,000 incidents of missing children were reported to Florida law enforcement agencies. Since its inception statewide, AMBER Alerts have directly aided in the rescue of 76 children.
