CHAPTER 11B-20, FLORIDA ADMINISTRATIVE CODE

AMENDING RULES 11B-20.001, 11B-20.0013, 11B-20.0014, 11B-20.0016, and 11B-20.0017 CERTIFICATION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE TRAINING INSTRUCTORS

SUMMARY OF THE RULE

Revised Instructor Certification Application, form CJSTC-71; Instructor Competency Checklist, form CJSTC-81; Instructor Certification Deficiency Notification, form CJSTC-271; Instructor Compliance Application, form CJSTC-84; implementation of the CMI Inc., Intoxilyzer 9000; certification requirements for Intoxilyzer 9000 Breath Test Operator, Agency Inspector, Breath Test Instructor, and associated renewal courses; Vehicle Operations Instructor Course; Firearms Instructor Course; and First Responder Instructor Course.

FACTS AND CIRCUMSTANCES JUSTIFYING THE RULE

11B-20.001(2)(a): Incorporates the revised Instructor Certification Application, form CJSTC-71, to add Breath Test-9000 to the instructor certification categories, pursuant to the implementation of CMI, Inc., Intoxilyzer 9000.

11B-20.001(3)(a)3.a.: Incorporates the revised Instructor Competency Checklist, form CJSTC-81, to add Breath Test-9000 to the instructor certification categories, pursuant to the implementation of CMI, Inc., Intoxilyzer 9000.

(5) "Labels" shall mean shipping labels provided by the Department for the return of DNA sample collection kits.

(6) FALCON is Florida's Integrated Criminal History System. This system allows for the biometric identification of criminal subjects.

(7) "Rapid-ID Edge Device" shall mean an electronic fingerprint device attached to "FALCON" and available to criminal justice agencies within the state. This device and accompanying software allows agencies responsible for sample collection to determine if a qualifying offender DNA sample is on file, or if collection of the sample is required.

(8) "Rapid DNA booking device" shall mean a fully automated system, approved for use at NDIS by law enforcement booking agency, to produce a CODIS acceptable DNA profile from an arrestee buccal swab without human interpretation in under two hours.

(9) "Rapid DNA Anaylsis" shall mean a fully automated process of developing a CODIS acceptable DNA profile from a buccal sample without human interpretation. This type of analyses provides a proper procedure, including requisite identification information, for state and local law enforcement and correctional agencies to collect and submit DNA samples to be maintained in the statewide DNA database.

A qualifying offender may also be identified through use of the Falcon Rapid-ID Edge device or during the process of Rapid DNA Analysis.

1. DNA samples submitted from qualifying offenders without the use of the Falcon Rapid-ID Edge device must be accompanied by a completed Swab Collection Kit form FDLE/FOR-005. The imprinting of the offender's left and right thumbs, by means of an inked impression, in the spaces indicated on the form shall be completed as well. Inked fingerprint impressions must be legible for fingerprint classification and comparison purposes. DNA samples accompanied by one or more illegible inked fingerprint impressions will be unacceptable for entry into the DNA Database and will be rejected by FDLE. The collecting agency must then submit a new DNA sample and completed form.

2. DNA sSamples submitted from qualifying offenders through use of the FALCON Rapid-ID Edge device must be accompanied by the printout and barcode generated by the application. Any required information not captured by the Falcon/Rapid-ID DNA Availability application shall be filled out on the Swab Collection Kit form FDLE/FOR-005.

3. DNA samples submitted from qualifying offenders and processed through the use of Rapid DNA Analysis shall include the submission of an additional DNA sample taken and accompanied by the printout and barcode generated by the application. Any required information not captured by the Falcon/Rapid-ID DNA Availability application shall be filled out on the Swab Collection Kit form FDLE/FOR-005.

(b) When identification of the qualifying offender is accomplished, DNA samples shall be taken from the qualifying offender in the manner described in section 943.325(3), F.S.

CHAPTER 11D-8 IMPLIED CONSENT PROGRAM

11D-8.003 Approval of Breath Test Methods and Instruments.

(1) The approved breath test method for evidentiary breath testing is Infrared Spectroscopy, also known as Infrared Light Absorption.

(2) The Department approves breath test methods and new instrumentation to ensure the accuracy and reliability of breath test results. The approved breath test instrument make and model is the CMI, Inc. Intoxilyzer 8000 and Intoxilyzer 9000 using software evaluated by the Department in accordance with Instrument Evaluation Procedures FDLE/ATP Form 34, revised March 2004, effective date July 2015, hereby incorporated by reference, <u>https://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-05645</u>. This form may be obtained by contacting the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Alcohol Testing Program, P.O.Box 1489, Tallahassee, Florida 32302.

(3) A Department inspection performed in accordance with Rule 11D-8.004, F.A.C., validates the approval, accuracy and reliability of an evidentiary breath test instrument.

(4) The Department shall conduct evaluations for approval of new instrumentation under subsection (2) in accordance with Instrument Evaluation Procedures FDLE/ATP Form 34 – Rev. March 2004.

(5) The availability or approval of new instruments, evaluation of software, options or modifications does not negate the approval status of previously approved instruments, or evaluated software, options or modifications. An approved make and model of a breath test instrument remains approved until disapproved by the Department.

11D-8.0035 Approval of Alcohol Reference Solution and Sources.

(1) The Department shall approve a source of alcohol reference solution for use by agencies in the State of Florida. The source approved by the Department shall be an <u>ISO 17034 or similarly accredited</u> entity that manufactures alcohol reference solutions and meets the following requirements:

(a) The source must prepare alcohol reference solution, and be capable of producing a minimum batch volume of 800 bottles, each containing at least 500 milliliters, to produce the following vapor alcohol concentrations: 0.05 g/210L, 0.08 g/210L, and 0.20g/210L;

(b) The source must have performed and documented tests that demonstrate that the alcohol reference solutions are reliable for at least two years from the date of manufacture.

(2) The Department shall approve each lot of alcohol reference solution prior to distribution for use in Florida.

(a) (2) If an ISO 17034 or similiary accredited provider is not available T the Department shall approve each lot prior to distribution in Florida by determineing the alcohol concentration in a minimum of ten (10) sample bottles of each lot of alcohol reference solution using gas chromatography or other scientifically accepted method at the time such lots are submitted for approval. Duplicate analyses will be performed on each sample bottle of alcohol reference solution. If any result falls outside the alcohol reference solution acceptable range, a second set of analyses will be performed. If the second set of results are within the alcohol reference solution acceptable range, the alcohol reference solution shall be approved. If any of the results fall outside the alcohol reference solution acceptable range a second time, the alcohol reference solution shall be disapproved.

(<u>ab</u>) <u>When</u> Tthe Department <u>approved a lot it</u> shall notify the source that the approved lots may be distributed for use in Florida, and shall issue a Certificate of Assurance, FDLE/ATP Form 32 revised March 2001, effective date July 2015, hereby incorporated by reference, <u>https://www.flrules.org/Gateway/reference.asp?No=Ref-05643</u> This form may be obtained by contacting the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Alcohol Testing Program, P.O. Box 1489, Tallahassee, Florida 32302.

(3) Alcohol reference solution lots approved by the Department shall be used in agency or Department inspections within two (2) years of the date of manufacture.

The Florida Law Enforcement Officers' Hall of Fame recognizes and honors law enforcement officers who put their lives on the line for the safety and protection of Florida's citizens and visitors through their works, service and exemplary accomplishments.

Nominations were accepted from the Florida Sheriffs Association, the Florida Police Chiefs Association, the Police Benevolent Association, the Fraternal Order of Police and the State Law Enforcement Chiefs' Association. One representative from each association served on the Selection Committee that identified five nominees for consideration for approval by the Governor and Cabinet. An induction ceremony will be held on Saturday, May 18, 2024.

2024 HALL OF FAME NOMINEES:

Mark Bohne, for over 33 years, has embodied dedication and commitment in service to his fellow officers and has established himself as a consummate law enforcement professional who is selflessly devoted to serving his community. He began his career as a patrol officer for the Riviera Beach Police Department and has served numerous departments over the years. In 1983, Officer Bohne joined the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office. After only three years with the PBSO, Officer Bohne had a life changing experience. While responding to a disturbance outside a nightclub, Bohne sustained five gunshot wounds, and despite sustaining life threatening injuries, pursued the suspect until other officers arrived on scene. Bohne was mindful that his bulletproof vest helped to save his life, and he turned that near fatal experience into a voice to increase the awareness and utilization of life protecting equipment. Officer Bohne went on to found a non-profit organization called the Law Enforcement Assistance Foundation (LEAF); its primary mission is to provide financial assistance to law enforcement officers who are seriously injured or have suffered a catastrophic event and to aid families of officers who are killed in the line of duty. For more than 30 years now, under Officer Mark Bohne's leadership, LEAF has distributed more than \$1,000,000 to the families of fellow law enforcement officers. Continuing to look out for his fellow officers. Mark additionally served as the unofficial BBQ Sergeant helping to feed and raise funds for fellow officers. Most notably, when Palm Beach County was hit with back-to-back hurricanes in 2004. Mark used his food service contacts to feed 1,000 employees and any citizen that walking by needing a hot meal. Mark Bohne proudly served with PBSO until 2010, and during that time, he received numerous accolades including the PBSO "Officer of the Month" Award. Officer Bohne's lifetime dedication and determination of selfless service towards his county and fellow officers, demonstrates the hallmarks of a true law enforcement professional.

Michael Joyner began his law enforcement career with the Monticello Police Department and was later hired by the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department. During his 12 years working for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department, Joyner saved the lives of four individuals in three separate

incidents. In 1982, he was nominated for "Top Officer" by the American Legion. In 1986, Citrus County Sheriff Charlie Dean hired Joyner to work a long-term undercover operation that lasted 18 months. The intense operation infiltrated three drug smuggling rings and uncovered a Mafiaowned restaurant/bar/nightclub (SeaWolf) in Citrus County. The operation resulted with 72 indictments and 100 percent convictions. At the conclusion of that operation, Joyner was promoted to lieutenant over the Special Operations Unit. Joyner was an incredibly talented law enforcement officer; he often worked undercover and was placed in prisons or county jails seven times in Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, and Tennessee. While undercover, he played a part in solving several homicides; his most notable undercover case was that of female serial killer, Aileen Wuornos. Joyner served for many sheriff's offices throughout Florida, and in 2005, retired with 32 years of service. Joyner has received numerous awards and is one of only four lifetime members of the Florida Intelligence Unit. He was also awarded the Narcotics Officer of the Year by The Florida Narcotics Officers' Association. The United States Drug Enforcement Administration awarded him with several plagues for their appreciation of his outstanding contributions in the field of drug law enforcement. The United States Marshal's Service and the United States Customs Service gave him plaques for his contributions to their services. Joyner is well known amongst the vice and narcotics enforcement communities as not only a leader of good, solid units, but as a leader who led from the front, on the street, getting the work done daily. In 2011, Governor Rick Scott appointed Joyner to the Levy County Board of Commissioners to fill a vacancy. Since then, Mike has continued his humble style of leadership by serving again in a different, yet ever selfless manner. He has sought and won reelection and continues to serve the citizens of Levy County in the only way he knows how--consistently, evenly and with total idea of others before self. Joyner's service speaks volumes to his commitment, leadership, and unbelievable success serving many sheriffs.

Rene Landa has served the residents of South Florida for a total of 43 years as a law enforcement officer with three different police departments. His unselfish dedication as a crime fighter and law enforcement leader is well known, and he has a legacy of contributing to the advancement of the law enforcement field. Chief Landa began as a patrol officer for the Miami Police Department in 1980 and served for 24 years. During that time, he risked his life working as an undercover narcotics detective and SWAT officer during the cocaine wars of the 1980s and 1990s. He also worked the Special Investigations Section, Street Narcotics Unit, Special Events, The Sexual Battery Unit, Planning and Research, the Emergency Planner, Terrorism Task Force, and rose through the ranks to become one of the commanders for the City of Miami Police Department's elite SWAT team. Landa joined the Key Biscayne Police Department as a major and was promoted to division chief. In 2010, he joined the South Miami Police Department as a major and was promoted to chief of police in 2014. In 2014, under the watch of Chief Landa, the South Miami Police Department also received for the first-time accreditation status by the Commission on Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation. Landa led the charge and set the tone for the SMPD during the COVID 19 Pandemic and during the "Defund the Police" movement. Landa became very concerned with officer morale and ensured all the officers stayed positive. In May of 2021, Landa became the president of the MDCACP. Based on what he had learned from the pandemic and the anti-police movement, he wanted to create an entity to assist the smaller departments with mental wellness for law enforcement's number one asset, that of personnel. Landa's dedication as a crime fighter and law enforcement leader is well known and upon his retirement will leave a legacy of contributing to the advancement of the law enforcement field. Landa's leadership over the years has made a great impact in the community; he puts others before himself and is always looking for ways to better law enforcement agencies.

Don Moreland began serving his community in 1952 when he enlisted into the United States Navy and served his nation until 1956. After his service in the Navy, Sheriff Moreland immediately returned to Marion County to begin his 47-year law enforcement career. In 1957, Moreland joined the Marion County Sheriff's Office as a deputy and moved up through the ranks of sergeant, lieutenant, and captain in uniformed patrol until he was elected sheriff of Marion County in 1972. During his time as sheriff for Marion County law enforcement, society changed at a rapid pace. Sheriff Moreland's leadership and management skills allowed him to help move the county forward in those changing times. From 1973 to 1976, Sheriff Moreland permitted inmates to earn their GED high school diploma on a request basis, provided library services in the jail, increased medical services for inmates by contracting with local doctors and created an inmate fund account for purchasing without any cost to taxpayers. Sheriff Moreland instituted a policy for competitive bidding on purchasing for the agency and brought the agency into the computer age for analysis of crime and calls for service data. Moreland was one of the first sheriffs to establish a Career Service Act for the employees and under his leadership the Marion County Sheriff's Office became the sixth sheriff's office to be CALEA accredited in the state of Florida. Moreland was the recipient of the 1975 Distinguished Service Award for Law Enforcement and was a graduate of the FBI National Academy 102 Session. In 1977, Governor Askew appointed Moreland to the Governor's Commission on Criminal Justice Standards and Goals as a member of the Criminal Justice Information Systems Council. Moreland also served as the president of the Florida Sheriff's Association for the years of 1981 and 1982. Moreland left office in 1993 but continued to serve after being appointed by President Bill Clinton as U.S Marshal for the Central Florida District. Moreland has represented not only his county but this nation with great distinction and is a shining example for future generations of law enforcement officers.

Daniel A. Smith Officer Daniel Smith's law enforcement career began with the Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) in 1990. During his time with FHP, Officer Smith's commitment to public safety shone through as he earned recognition as a top DUI Trooper in Florida, with more than 200 DUI arrests in three consecutive years. His remarkable accomplishments underscored his unwavering dedication to removing impaired drivers from the roads and protecting innocent lives. After joining the Coral Gables Police Department in 1996, Smith continued to display professionalism, courage, and dedication. He has been called a cornerstone of the department, and his fellow officers have said that his retirement has left an irreplaceable void. Smith's commitment to justice is evident in his extensive record of investigating and documenting more than 2,000 cases involving DUI crashes and trials. The lives saved due to his diligence and expertise cannot be quantified, and the families spared from the anguish of losing a loved one due to his efforts are a testament to his immeasurable impact. Tragically, Smith knows the heartache of losing a family member to drunk drivers firsthand. His brother, FHP Trooper Robert Smith, was killed in the line of duty by a drunk driver in 1997. In 2014, Smith received the Robert DeKorte Memorial Award, which is the highest honor bestowed upon an officer in the City of Coral Gables. Smith embodies the qualities that this award represents-courage, dedication, and devotion to duty. Beyond his law enforcement duties, he coached, mentored, and served as a role model to high school students in baseball,

from 1994 to 2023. Smith coached fall ball and worked the summer season where the team would travel out of town to play opposing teams. Danny has been able to guide young men towards a brighter future by using his experience as a College World Series MVP, a Hall of Fame pitcher for the University of Miami, and a major league baseball player. Throughout Smith's illustrious career he has been able to influence his fellow officers as well. He served as a field training officer for over 23 years, which allowed him to have hands-on training with a significant portion of the Coral Gables Police Department. An officer who once worked with him said that "[Officer Smith] can be counted on to teach, mentor, and evaluate at the highest standard." This same officer stated that "[Officer Smith] routinely is called upon to handle the most difficult of training situations where documentation, patience, and impartial view is needed to help the probationary officer and the department." Officer Smith's reputation as the department's finest and most respected field training officer underscores his commitment to cultivating excellence with his colleagues. In a day and age where selfishness rules the day, Smith is always there for others and sacrifices himself to better those around him. His dedication to public safety, mentorship, and community service embodies the highest standards of the profession and leaves a lasting legacy that will continue to inspire generations to come.

While responding to a disturbance outside a nightclub, Mark sustained five gunshot wounds to his shoulder, thigh, and chest. Despite being shot numerous times and not knowing whether he was going to make it, Mark courageously pursued the suspect until other officers arrived on the scene. Mindful that his bulletproof vest had helped save his life, Mark would turn that near fatal experience into lending his voice to increasing the awareness and utilization of this life protecting equipment, even testifying before a Congressional committee in Washington, D.C.

The shooting incident also taught Mark about the importance of banding together to raise funds for officers who were also injured in the line of duty and unable to provide for their families. Together, with the same friends who helped support him and his family during his time of need, Mark founded a non-profit organization called "Law Enforcement Assistance Foundation" (LEAF), a 501 c3, whose primary mission is to provide financial assistance to law enforcement officers who are seriously injured or who have suffered a catastrophic event, as well as to the families of officers killed in the line of duty. For over 30 years, under Mark's leadership, LEAF has distributed over \$1,000,000 to the families of his brothers and sisters in blue.

In addition to his dedication and commitment to LEAF, Mark has leveraged his relationships with food service vendors to serve food to feed 1,000 PBSO employees after Palm Beach County was hit with back to back hurricanes in 2004. Many of those

officers still recall how those hot meals helped keep them going during the strenuous recovery efforts following those devastating hurricanes.

Throughout his career, Mark has demonstrated an unwavering commitment to his fellow officers, their families, and his community. His lifetime of selfless service demonstrates the hallmarks of a true law enforcement professional and there is no better forum to recognize his distinguished career than by joining so many other outstanding law enforcement professionals in the Florida Law Enforcement Officers' Hall of Fame.

On April 21^{st,} 1986, patrolman Mark C. Bohne was shot 5 times while responding to a disturbance call outside of a nightclub. Mark, who had been shot in the shoulder, thigh, and twice in the chest, pursued the suspect until other officers could assist. It was only after he pulled his patrol car to the side of the road that he realized he was in bad shape. He wouldn't know until days later that the bulletproof vest he had received as a Christmas gift had saved his life. Little did he know that this fateful night would be the catalyst for an incredible journey of resilience, dedication, and service that would span decades.

Responding to trouble was how Mark got his start in law enforcement. While working as an unarmed security guard at the Palm Beach Jai Alai Fronton, Mark observed an armed security guard being assaulted by two men. Mark jumped into the fray to help the officer who happened to be a Riviera Beach Police officer working an extra off duty job. The next day Mark received a phone call asking him, 'if he was interested in becoming a police officer?' The pay sounded good, so he signed up. Mark started right away and later attended the Police Academy, at what was then Palm Beach Community College. Mark graduated in 1974 with the 4th graduating class.

Mark worked for both the Riviera Beach Police Department and the Palm Beach Gardens Police Department before making the move to the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office. He had only been with the Sheriff's office for 3 years when he responded to that call in April 1986 that changed his life.

In 1986, bulletproof vests were available to officers that wanted to wear one, but they were not a required part of the officer's uniform. It has been written that there was a storage room in the Palm Beach County Sheriff's office with a pile of vests 'gathering dust' but just days after the shooting, the pile had been cut in half.

The landscape of law enforcement in the 1980s was different, with bulletproof vests not being mandatory attire for officers. Mark's brush with death instigated a change. He recognized the importance of these vests in safeguarding those who swore to protect their communities. Through his testimony before a Congressional Committee in Washington DC, he imparted the raw truth of his experience, a firsthand account of how a seemingly simple piece of equipment had shielded him from mortal danger. His voice became a catalyst for change, leading to increased awareness and utilization of this life-preserving gear. It is unknown how many police officers' lives he has helped save by sharing his experience.

While Mark was making headlines for surviving that night, what many people didn't know was how the shooting had impacted Mark's family finances. At the time of the shooting, Mark was building a new home in Jupiter and had two small children. He had been supplementing his income with a second job catering, but while recovering from the shooting he was unable to work either job. Several friends banded together to help, and they planned a 'Benefit BBQ' to raise money for Mark and his family.

The BBQ was successful in helping Mark's family bridge the financial gap until he could get back to work. The BBQ was also successful in an unintended way. Mark recognized that other law-enforcement officers injured in the line of duty would have the same struggle. So, he partnered with the same group of friends that helped him and set out to assist with the financial impact.

A year after being shot, Mark and his friends Gary Hogan, Billy Bowman, and Marty Perry founded the Law Enforcement Assistance Foundation (LEAF) a 501©3 organization whose sole mission is to 'provide financial assistance to law enforcement officers seriously injured or who have suffered a catastrophic event and the families of officers killed in the line of duty.'

Over three decades, Mark Bohne's leadership as the Executive Director of LEAF transformed it from a vision into a formidable charitable organization. LEAF's mission to alleviate the financial burdens of officers injured or killed in the line of duty demonstrated Mark's enduring commitment to his brothers and sisters in blue. LEAF has distributed over \$1,000,000 and the families that benefited will never forget the help they got when they needed it most. For the first 25 years, Mark guided LEAF without any compensation. At the April 2012 Board of Directors meeting, the board voted to start paying Mark for his hard work and dedication. Only in 2019, did Mark step down from that role. He continues to serve on the board of directors as well as mentoring the new director.

Mark has been looking out for his fellow officers in other ways as well. Mark has served as the unofficial BBQ Sergeant for years helping with BBQ services when needed. Most notably when Palm Beach County was hit with back-to-back hurricanes in 2004. Mark used his food service contacts to feed 1000 employees and any citizen that walked up in need of a hot meal.

Local law enforcement officers were working around the clock to maintain order after the area was hit by two major hurricanes in three weeks. Power was out for most of the county, and many of the officers working to keep order didn't have power in their own homes. Mark was asked to help, and as always, he responded. Mark and his crew quickly set to feeding the officers working non-stop in the Florida heat. Many officers still remember those meals that kept them going during those long hot September days.

For 33 years, Mark Bohne has exemplified what it means to respond to trouble with courage and compassion. His journey embodies the essence of a true law enforcement professional - one who serves not out of obligation, but from a place of profound commitment to the well-being of his community and colleagues. The nomination for the Hall of Fame is more than just an accolade; it's a recognition of a life defined by selflessness, perseverance, and dedication to the greater good.

Paim Beach County sheriff's deputy Mark Bohne — shot five times Monday by a bar patron who refused to pay his bill — probably would be dead had he not been wearing a bulletproof year, Sheriff Richard Wille said. Bohne was shot in the left shoulder, above the heart, in the

The bair's doorman flagged down Bohne's patrol car and said a gun-toting man left the lounge without paying his 225 bill. Reaching out to injured officers Group sets \$500,000 goal for fund-raising drive

WEST PALM BEACH - After Miami FBI agent Gordon McNeill was shot in the head and neck three years ago during the bloodiest shoo-tout in the FBI's history, he thought

tout in the FBI's history, he thought simply staving alive would be his biggest challenge. But McNelll, speaking Thursday on behall of a new Palm Beach County group formed to help injured officers and their families, said the financial costs became as much a burden as his injuries. raising campaign with a goal of \$500,000 for the Law Enforcement Assistance Foundation, According to LEAF statistics, 95 Palm Beach County law enforcement officers were injured on the job last year.

. Dozens of police chiefs and offi-cers istened to McNeill and others at a press conference Thursday at the Palm Hotel talk about fallen comrades, the danger of their jobs, and paying the ultimate price. They said insurance benefits and

donations from groups such as the Police Benevolent Association help cover costs when an officer is in-

jured or slain. But most officers and their families still don't have the money - which can reach into the hundreds of thousands of dollars -

Florida Law Enforcement Officers' Hall of Fame Summary of Professional Law Enforcement History Michael Floyd Joyner

in 1973, Mike Joyner began his law enforcement career with the Monticello Police Department and five months later, Mike was hired by the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department. During the twelve years Mike worked for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department, he saved the lives of four individuals, in three separate incidents (see documentation – Tab 6). In 1982, Mike was nominated for "Top Officer" by the American Legion.

In 1986, Citrus County Sheriff Charlie Dean hired Mike to work a long-term undercover operation that lasted 18 months. The intense operation infiltrated three drug smuggling rings and uncovered a mafia-owned restaurant/bar/nightclub (SeaWolf) in Citrus County. The operation resulted with 72 indictments and 100% convictions. At the conclusion of that operation, Mike was promoted to Lieutenant over the Special Operations Unit.

Mike was a very talented law enforcement officer working undercover. He was placed in prisons or county jails seven times in Florida, Georgia, Tennessee and Louisiana. While serving in an undercover capacity, several homicides were solved and suspects were convicted. In another undercover roll, Mike traveled to Michigan and lived temporarily with suspect Michael Saffell, who eventually confessed to the homicide of an elderly woman (Glenda Whip) in Citrus County. Mike also traveled to Upper New York and worked as an undercover cook at the Salvation Army, which resulted in solving a homicide case that occurred in Florida.

Mike's most notable undercover case was that of female serial killer, Aileen Wuornos. Mike was placed undercover to ride with a motorcycle gang to locate Wuornos. Wuornos was located by Mike, in Daytona Beach at a biker bar called the Port Orange Bar. After working three days and nights gaining Wuornos' confidence, Mike was able to obtain enough evidence to convict her of killing seven men in the State of Florida. Aileen Wuornos was sentenced to death and was executed in October 2002.

Sheriff Charlie Dean awarded Mike with the Medal of Distinction, "Presented in recognition of your exceptional courage and personal commitment while working under cover, as demonstrated by your contributions to major cases involving the separate captures of murder suspects Alleen Wuornos and Michael Saffeli, and the investigation into activities at the Sea Wolf." (See documentation -- Tab 6)

After leaving the Citrus County Sheriff's Office, Mike continued his law enforcement career working at the Marion County Sheriff's Office, Levy County Sheriff's Office, Gadsden County Sheriff's Office and finally returning to the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office as the Undersheriff. In 2005, Mike retired with 32 years of service. Currently, Mike serves as a Levy County County Commissioner, District 3.

Mike is one of only four lifetime members of the Florida Intelligence Unit. He was also awarded the Narcotics Officer of the Year by The Florida Narcotic Officers' Association. The United States Drug Enforcement Administration awarded Mike several plaques for their appreciation in his outstanding contributions in the field of drug law enforcement. The United States Marshal's Service and the United States Customs Service gave Mike plaques for his contributions to their Services. (See documentation – Tab 6)

Florida Law Enforcement Officers' Hall of Fame Description of why Michael Floyd Joyner should be selected

In trying to decide how to put into words the reasons why Mike Joyner should be selected for the Law Enforcement Officers' Hall of Fame, I contacted many people who knew Mike. Unanimously, all agreed that Mike has done so much in and for the field of narcotic and undercover law enforcement, it came to no surprise that he was being nominated. Below are two independent submissions about Mike and it is interesting to see the common thread between the two, leadership, selfiessness, dedication and commitment. The first is by Captain David Pate, with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and the second is by retired Sheriff/Senator Charlie Dean.

In recent years, there has been a great deal of discussion within the Public Safety Community regarding the concept of sheepdogs. A sheepdog is a person who protects the flock with little or no regard for their own safety. They do not do it because they are told to or because they are required to. They do it because of who they are, as they know this is the most honorable way to serve. They are the true servant leaders of our society. Mike Joyner is one of these rare individuals who would tell you his career of service was good and honorable, yet unremarkable. Mike Joyner humbly is a true servant leader and sheepdog to every community in Florida and has lived quite a remarkable career.

Whather we are discussing the selfless and dangerous undercover work done on our behalf by Mike to eradicate crack, marijuana and meth from our streets, or the brilliant and painstaking role in putting one of the nation's worst serial killers behind bars, Mike's legacy of behind the scenes service speaks volumes. Mike is well known amongst the vice and narcotics enforcement communities as not only a leader of good, solid units, but as a leader who led from the front, on the street, getting the work done daily. As a Detective with the Leon County Sheriff's Office, I had the opportunity on multiple occasions to work with Mike on various projects. No matter his role, he could always illicit the best in people, if only through his wry sense of humor, his wisdom or through his constant examples of leadership.

Mike also had an incredible impact on the intelligence Community in Florida having served in multiple roles for the Florida Intelligence Unit (FIU). In addition to having served as President of this organization, he is but one of a small handful of individuals who have since 1961, been awarded life membership in this organization. He continues to serve the FlU as an advisory board member, helping to guide delivery of training and policy to multiple member agencies for this important law enforcement function. When I became the President of the FIU in 2002, Mike provided guidance and advice to me and the others who followed me, creating another example of how he quietly served the law enforcement community.

Even in retirement, Mike continues to serve the people of his lifelong community. In 2011, Governor Rick Scott appointed Mike to the Levy County Board of Commissioners to fill a vacancy. Since then Mike has continued his humble style of leadership by serving again in a different, yet ever selfless manner. He has sought and won reelection and continues to serve the citizens of Levy County in the only way he knows how-consistently, evenly and with the total idea of others before self. Mike Joyner is in fact, a sheepdog. Submitted by David Pate. As the Sheriff of Jefferson County (James Scott) was retiring in 1986, he called me and suggested I meet one of his deputies (Investigator). Based on what Sheriff Scott shared about this deputy, his character, professionalism, background and expertise, I agreed to the meeting. I wanted to have an eye to eye meeting with Mike Joyner, and afterwards found there was no doubt that he would fit my needs. As Sheriff of Citrus County, I needed the right person for an undercover operation; however, I didn't want anyone to know about or get suspicious of Mike. After discussing my expectations, he agreed and we began our first operation.

What you glean from your first operation, is the inner knowledge an officer has, his courage, personal commitment and dependability without the need of daily or traditional supervision. Details and documentation are part of the evidence necessary for court conviction, but it also protects him and it protects you as Sheriff. Mike proved all of the above during his first assignment with Cltrus County Sheriff's Office and was very impressive working with the State Attorney's Office and State Department of Law Enforcement.

Another of Mike's attributes is his intensive perception of who he is working to arrest. His imagination is unbelievable! Without lingering on a particular case, as Sheriff, when you have the FBI come to your small county Sheriff's Office and seek out an undercover agent you really burst with pride, which was Mike Joyner.

Nothing could be more of a recommendation to Mike's career than his accomplishment in the Alleen Wuornos case of a serial killer, her conviction of killing seven men and her execution.

Sending Mike on an assignment anywhere or under any circumstance could not be better documented than when he was placed in a prison cell in Michigan with Michael Saffeli. It was during this assignment when Mike documented Saffeli's confession of killing an elderly woman, Glenda Whip.

There was a time when you could not bring up Mike Joyner in a conversation that the US Marshal's Service, DEA, US Customs Service all had a special reminiscence of Mike Joyner. Mike's knowledge of narcotics, capturing dope dealers and working endless hours to train other officers, as well as his attention to detail, are just some of his contributions to local, state and federal law enforcement.

Mike's service speaks volumes to his commitment, leadership and unbellevable success, serving many Sheriffs. Before Mike retired with 32 years of service, he returned to his home county, to serve as Undersheriff of Jefferson County.

It was my privilege to recommend to the Governor that Mike be appointed to fill the Levy County Commission seat that was vacant. Mike was appointed and has the enviable record of running and winning two times as County Commissioner in Levy County.

I want to say thank you to Mike's loving family, for all of their support through Mike's career. I am so proud to recommend Mike Joyner for the Law Enforcement Officers' Hall of Fame. What a deserving professional law man!

My recommendation is based on my service as Past President of the Florida Sheriff's Association, Past Executive Board member of the National Sheriff's Association, State Representative and State Senator all of which I have retired, serving 45 years to the great people of the State of Florida. You have read about Mike Joyner and his incredible law enforcement career in the previous pages. What you haven't read, is about Mike Joyner the dedicated husband, father, grandfather, cattleman and friend. Mike was born in Georgia in the because that was where the closest mid-wife was located to his parents' home in Tallahassee, Florida. Mike grew up in Jefferson County, Florida where he and his siblings learned from their parents, the important characteristics of faith, honesty, determination and loyalty. It is these characteristics that have made and saved Mike throughout his courageous law enforcement career. In fact, I would say these characteristics have saved Mike throughout his life.

Mike and his wife Diane, have two grown children and three grandchildren. I can tell you from firsthand experience that those three granddaughters are the light in Mike's eyes, every day he wakes up. When Diane was working as the Post-Mistress at the local post office, she would get up every morning at 3:00am to get ready for work. And Mike being Mike, he would get up with Diane and would follow her to the post office to make sure she was safe in the wee hours of the morning. It is this type of selfless act that Mike does, not only for his family but for others he comes into contact with.

In 1984, a friend of Mike's (Joel Broome) passed away leaving a wife and small daughter behind. Mike helped this family through their time of sorrow. He even organized a 5K run to help support the family financially. In a thank you note from Mrs. Charlotte Broome, she writes "Dear Mike, I want to thank you for all that you have done for Ashlee and me. I know it took a lot of your time to organize and put on the 5K run and I can never really express to you how much it has meant to me. One day when Ashlee is older she will understand all of this and all the things you all have done will help her to understand how special her daddy was." (See documentation – Tab 7)

Mike's own son, Michael Floyd Joyner, Jr., affectionately known as Scooter, suffered a devastating farming accident losing all fingers of his right hand except his thumb. Scooter is a deputy sheriff in Marion County and was right-handed. Mike never left Scooter's side and never gave up on what he knew would be the toughest days ahead. It was his faith, honesty, determination and loyalty that helped both he and Scooter get through this very tough time. I'm am so very proud to say that Scooter has been through training to use his left hand and is still working in Marion County.

Mike is a cattleman and works both on his ranch and for others who need help working their cows. It was not long ago that Mike helped a family (Jamle Baker) that was dealing with a very rare illness of their young daughter. It was very stressful for the family and they decided to move to Parls, Texas so they could be closer to their family, for support. The father shared with Mike that he would have to make two trips, in order for his daughter to have her horse. Mike made it very clear to the father that he wouldn't need to do that because he (Mike) would load the young girl's horse in his trailer and follow them to Texas. The very next day, Mike Joyner did just that and drove to Texas taking the horse to be with the young girl.

This is Mike Joyner, the one who puts others before himself, always has and always wili.

Highlights of his career easily serve as a historical for police work in the City of Miami. For example; beginning his career during the 1980 McDuffie Riots, then by catching criminals who were released from Cuban prisons during the Mariel boatlift. He later risked his life as an undercover narcotics detective and as a SWAT officer during the cocaine wars of the 1980's and 1990's. He also worked the Special Investigations Section, Street Narcotics Unit, Special Events, The Sexual Battery Unit, Planning and Research, the Emergency Planner, Terrorism Task Force, and rose thru the ranks to become one of the commanders for the City of Miami Police Department's elite SWAT team. Chief Rene Landa displayed his leadership skills during the COVID 19 Pandemic of 2020. Although 2020 and 2021 were horrible years for our great country and for law enforcement, the men and women of the SMPD came to protect and serve the City of South Miami and its residents every day twenty-four hours a day without hesitation because of Chief Landa's leadership Chief Landa led the charge and set the tone for our employees; sworn and civilian alike, coming to work while having to fight an invisible enemy, the COVID 19 Pandemic. Despite the threat and safety measures we experienced a significant number of employees being infected with the virus, some very serious, including the chief who continued to work the streets with his officers. Simultaneously, during the "Defund the Police" movement, he became very concerned with officer morale and ensured all or our officers stayed positive and directed citizens who wished to help to the SMPD. We were the recipient of several pro-police parades here as well as numerous donations of "treats" for the officers in the community's attempts to show their support in collaboration with Chief Landa.

Chief Landa became the President of the MDCACP in May of 2021. Based on what he learned during the pandemic and the anti-police movement he wanted to create an entity to assist the smaller departments with mental wellness for law enforcement's number one asset, that of personnel. He immediately got to work on this worthwhile pet project and searched for partners to ensure the success of it. He partnered with the Boulder Crest Foundation which is a nationally recognized 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization

providing mental wellness care for military veterans and first responders. The MDCACP now has monthly mental wellness workshops.

The MDCACP is comprised of 37 different police departments from local and state agencies. This afforded Boulder Crest the opportunity to pilot Struggle Well training within a vast number of police departments at the same time. Chief Landa was the catalyst that commenced this important critical stop for Boulder Crest. It allowed us the opportunity to validate the training from a large departmental sample. A regional program involving the 37 agencies was formed, to include Struggle Well monthly 5-day trainings and 2-day quarterly Struggle Well leadership training.

Chief Landa's passion for supporting first responders is truly remarkable. He has continued to be the portal of communication for Struggle Well, relaying consistent information for all 37 police agencies. Chief Landa opens every training session and explains to the participants the commitment their executive staff have made to the Struggle Well training. Due to his leadership, the MDCACP has created a Regional Peer Support Unit that will support any police civilian or sworn personnel (from the 37 police agencies) that needs assistance related to struggles and challenges being faced. It is expected that the Regional Peer Support Unit will commence in August-September of this year. They are currently vetting the peer counselors prior to training them. In addition, Chief Landa is currently working to create follow-up mechanisms, such as training notes, videos, audio files, that support the Struggle Well Training.

The partnership created by Chief Rene Landa (Boulder Crest and MDCACP) currently serves all the agencies of Miami-Dade County. The impact of this partnership creates a ripple effect of wellness to all police personnel, their families, and the community alike. The negative cause and effect from a police officer that is struggling from personal and professional stressors can be significantly is toxic. The negative spiral can be felt by their loved ones and community they serve. The Struggle Well training is making a significant difference by providing hope to struggling first responders.

The success accomplished by Chief Landa's support is now being replicated among other departments at a national level. The work to construct regional and large departmental models within Miami-Dade County are being replicated throughout Florida (Indian River, Tallahassee, and Broward and West Palm Beach areas). As an example, currently we are utilizing the work accomplished in Miami-Dade to implement departmental and regional models at the Fresno Police Department and Michigan State Police. Chief Landa is currently working with other Boulder Crest/Struggle Well personnel to develop follow-up mechanisms that support the 2-day and 5-day Struggle Well trainings.

I am writing this letter of recommendation in support of Retired Sheriff Don Moreland's nomination for induction into the Florida Law Enforcement Officers' Hall of Fame. As a fifth generation Marion County, Florida resident and a 33 year veteran of law Enforcement, I am familiar with the life and career of Sheriff Don Moreland and intimately familiar with the sacrifices all law enforcement officers make every day of their lives. I feel that Sheriff Don Moreland's contributions to both law enforcement and his community should be highlighted so that more people can become aware of his accomplishments.

Sheriff Moreland started serving his community in 1952 when he enlisted into the United States Navy and served his nation until 1956. Immediately following that in the same year, Sheriff Moreland returned to Marion County to begin his 47 yearlong law enforcement career starting with the Ocala Police Department from 1956 to 1957. Then in 1957, Sheriff Moreland left the Ocala Police Department and began serving Marion County with the Sheriff's Office. He was elected as Sheriff of Marion County in 1972 holding the Office of Sheriff until 1993.

During his career as Sheriff, law enforcement and society was changing at a rapid pace. Sheriff Moreland's leadership and management skills allowed him to move the Sheriff's Office into those changing times i.e., from 1973 to 1976 Sheriff Moreland permitted inmates to earn their GED high school diploma on a request basis, provided library services in the jail, increased medical services for inmates by contracting with local doctors and created an inmate fund account for purchasing without any cost to taxpayers. Sheriff Moreland instituted a policy for competitive bidding on purchasing for the agency and brought the agency into the computer age for analysis of crime and calls for service data. In 1987, Sheriff Moreland was one of the first Sheriffs to establish a Career Service Act (House Bill No. 1355 Chapter 87-457) for the employees and in 1989 under his leadership the Marion County Sheriff's Office became the sixth Sheriff's Office to be CALEA Accredited in the State of Florida.

Sheriff Moreland was the recipient of the 1975 Distinguished Service Award for Law Enforcement presented by the Florida Council on Crime and Delinquency and was a graduate of the FBI National Academy 102 Session. After leaving office in 1993, Sheriff Moreland was nominated and selected as the Central Florida's District U.S. Marshal, serving that post until 2003.

I believe that Sheriff Don Moreland has represented not only his county but this nation with great distinction and is a shining example for future generations of law enforcement officers. I strongly urge the selection of Retired Marion County Sheriff Don Moreland to be placed into the Florida Law Enforcement Officers' Hall of Fame.

Marion County Sheriff's Office is sixth in Florida to be granted accreditation

Florida continues to lead the nation in law enforcement accreditation, with six Sheriff's Offices fully accredited and ten in the process of becoming accredited.

No other state comes close. In the rest of the nation only 11 Sheriff's Offices are accredited, and 32 are in the process.

Marion County Sheriff's Office (Ocala) became number six in the accreditation parade during 1989 after spending three years revising policies and procedures to meet standards set by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA).

In the spring of 1989 a team of law enforcement professionals made an on-site assessment and announced that all 909 CALEA standards had been met. On April 2, 1989, the Commission met in Hartford, Connecticut, and granted accreditation to Marion County Sheriff Don Moreland and his staff.

"This process," said Moreland, "is the most effective means ever developed to insure delivery of quality, professional, effective law enforcement to the citizens of this country."

Florida Sheriff's Offices accredited prior to Marion County are Hillsborough, Broward, Monroe, Palm Beach and Pinellas.

Those currently in the self-assessment phase of preparation for accreditation are Charlotte, Collier, Escambia, Hernando, Indian River, Jacksonville (Duval County), Lee, Manatee, St. Johns and Volusia. Four others have applied and are expected to begin self-assessment in the near future.

Law enforcement agencies apply to CALEA for accreditation and spend several years in selfassessment in order to comply with CALEA standards. Then they have to pass an exacting on-site assessment to verify that they measure up to more than 900 criteria.

The on-site assessment is conducted by a team of three to five law enforcement professionals and lasts three to five days. The team welcomes community comments as well as reviews agency documents, tours facilities, observes activities and interviews personnel.

The final review which determines whether to grant or defer accreditation is conducted by the Commission, a 21-member group of law enforcement executives and leaders from the public and private sector.

Accreditation is for five years and requires annual reports from accredited agencies to document continued compliance with the standards.

CALEA is a private, non-profit entity formed in 1979 through the combined efforts of the National Sheriffs Association, the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives and the Police Executive Research Forum.

There are presently 784 U.S. and Canadian law enforcement agencies in various stages of the accreditation process.

My name is James Banks. I am retired from the Coral Gables Police Department with 15 years of service. Prior to that, I retired from the Philadelphia Police Department with 25 years of service.

I met Officer Danny Smith upon my arrival at the CGPD in January 2007. The environment was new to me. Danny was one of the first to welcome me to the Department. We immediately became friends. We are the same age, we both had Highway Patrol backgrounds, and we were both dedicated to the police profession and our families. I quickly learned that Danny possesses a wealth of knowledge, experience, is respected by his both peers and the community he serves- both on and off duty.

Philadelphia has no FTO program, so being trained by an FTO was new to me. I was doing so at 45 years of age. It took quite an adjustment. I hadn't experienced anything like it until I got to Florida. I counted on Danny for advice with my adjustment to a new state and new department. He always gave me the right advice and direction.
