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          I think there has been a note because I thought in
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          chapter 12 we had added a recommendation in
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          response to the new finding that we had. And I
          didn't see that referenced in the minutes or in
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          the report.
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So I don't know if now is the time to discuss

that report, but --

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CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Yeah, and I've got comments on that. You are correct. We went back and looked at it. We will take that as we get into the report, but we will note for the minutes of this meeting that -- in that section as we talk about chapter 12 that you have noted the discussion on a recommendation that the legislature consider implementing juvenile mental health and well-being courts and provide judges with more tools and consequences. That was discussed and I will talk about it when we get to it. But we will note that in these meetings. we will revise those minutes, accordingly. I think that is your point Commissioner, correct? MR. CARROLL: Yes, thanks.

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: All right. So we will go ahead and make that notation to it. Does anybody have any other discussion or revisions to the meeting minutes from October 15th or 16th?

UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Bob, the only ones that could be considered -- and it may be in the report. I sent information to Jennifer. I think, absent us requiring or recommending legislative

action, I don't know how that loggerhead between 1 2 Hollywood and Broward county works out. 3 Do you -- is that something that we should talk about now or is that in the final report? 4 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Yeah, let's wait on 5 6 that. Because, like I said, let's wait on that --7 we will go -- in fact, we're going to take that up next, so we will talk about that here in a second. 8 9 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Okay. 10 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: So anything else on the 11 minutes? 12 (NO RESPONSE.) 13 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: All in favor of approval 14 of the minutes signify by saying aye. 15 (CHORUS OF AYES.) 16 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Any opposed, same like 17 sign? 18 (NO RESPONSE.) 19 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Good. The motion passes 20 and the minutes are approved. 21 So I just want to -- for all of the 22 commissioners, you have received a couple of 23 versions. The most recent version of the report, which went out a couple of days ago -- and we have 24

been working very hard on trying to get this put

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1 together. And I think it is in good shape. I
2 hope you all feel the same way.

But it is still -- and it's not final until
we actually transmit it to the Governor and to the
presiding officers of the legislature. And so it
is still a work in progress.

Knowing that -- and we hope to -- the plan is to finalize it and get it to them tomorrow. But it's better that it be right and not quick. It could be Monday before we get it over there. And we're going to try to get it over there tomorrow.

And there are still a few typos, and numbering, and some other things that we are working on. But there is nothing substantive that has changed or will change. It's all style and formatting, just to make sure again, all of the i's are dotted and t's are crossed.

If anybody on the comission or anybody out there still sees anything in it -- we know that there are things in there that we are working on.

And also, nobody should use a version that is currently been distributed or made available publically as a final product of this commission until we actually transmit it to the Senate President, or Speaker of the House, and to the

Governor, which we will do either tomorrow or on Monday. So I want to make sure everybody is clear on that.

As far as a couple of issues that -- before we get into the report itself and we entertain a motion to approve the report -- the one -- Sheriff Judd, you just brought up the first topic that we need to discuss. You had asked us to -- in the intervening period between the last meeting and this meeting you had asked us to consider another proposed finding and recommendation regarding the, as you call it, the stalemate and the issue down in south Florida on the power issue.

We sent out your proposed recommendation -proposed finding and proposed recommendation. And
I asked everybody to also please look at -- as you
consider that -- what we have now currently in
chapter 4 in findings 2, 3, and 4 and
recommendations 1, 2, and 3. So if you want to
make a motion and somebody wants to second it we
can have discussion on it.

Before you do that, I just ask you to consider this, though, that I think, to some degree, I understand the problem down there, believe me, and the stalemate, and the untenable

situation. And the -- just the problem that they are -- although they are -- seems to be trying, at their pace, to work it out. Whether they will have success in that is yet to be seen.

But my concern with it is that the proposed recommendation -- I'm sorry the proposed finding is somewhat redundant of what we already have in chapters 2 -- in findings 2, 3, and 4, in chapter 4 -- to some degree is worded differently, but to some degree it's redundant.

But my concern with it is in the recommendation and I have talked to Jason Jones, our general counsel, who is on the phone. And he can weigh in on this -- is that I'm concerned about the recommendation. I'm not sure -- in fact, I have some real questions about whether the legislature can actually do what you're suggesting that we ask them to do. I get it, somebody needs to unclog that jamb down there.

But I don't think that, legally, with all the charters, imminent domain issues, taking clause issues, property rights, all of those things that the Governor can -- if the legislature can actually allow the Governor to just tell somebody to place power somewhere.

And I have concerns about us, as a

commission, recommending something that may not be

able to be done. So that's my concern with it.

But if you want us to pursue it we can have that discussion and further it. So it's up -- it's your motion Sheriff. If you want to make it, we can make it and we can have further discussion about it.

MUCH. And I hear clearly what you are say -- what you're saying. And you do understand that -- probably even better than the commission does that has slogged through this my -- my motion for -- is that we requested the legislature push forward that when a local community will not improve the radius system at -- on behalf of the public safety someone or somebody has got to -- to step in and go time out. Hollywood if you can't get along, Broward if you can't get along -- you know, we're dealing with public safety here.

And as a side note, I spoke with the CFO who used to be in the legislative process. And he said many times the filing of the legislation is enough to get them off centered for fear that they will have to wrestle that. So from a lawyers

1 prospective, I see that --2 (MULTIPLE SPEAKERS.) 3 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: -- I see the concerns. 4 But I also recognize from a operational 5 perspective when you got back -- and you -- let me 6 quote a old legislator, "the law is whatever we 7 decide it is in Florida." And so at some point in time someone has got 8 9 to step in and get that radius system fixed. 10 that's why I put the motion out and said let's ask 11 the legislature to introduce legislation when the 12 local people won't act and when public safety is 13 at risk --14 MR. SWEARINGEN: What (INDISCERNIBLE). 15 (MULTIPLE SPEAKERS.) 16 THE COURT REPORTER: I can't hear when you're 17 talking. 18 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: -- passionate enough about 19 the safety and security of these law enforcement 20 officers, firefighters, and paramedics who can get 21 in areas of Hollywood and that area of Broward 22 county without that last radio tower that their life is in peril, as well as the people that they 23 are trying to save and/or rescue. 24

And so I think it's worthy that we ask for

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it. If the legislature turns us down we asked for it; we tried to do something.

But the -- the other issue is -- is that we can, you know, bring Hollywood and the county commissioners one by one in front of us at the next meeting or some meeting next year and try to force this issue that way. But, you know, if they don't capitulate, we still have our law enforcement officers at risk and our community at risk.

I think it's worth an ask. But obviously, it's up to this commission. And I will agree with whatever y'all want, but that's -- that's, in the nutshell, my argument for putting a motion on the table.

(MULTIPLE SPEAKERS.)

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Okay. Hang on a second.

One at a time. Sheriff Ashley, go -- first of all, let's do this, so we can get this -- assuming that we are going to vote on it or have some posture on this, Sheriff Judd, just to get this, you know, procedurally correct and in the proper procedural posture for moving it forward, would you consider this at least for discussion purposes? I do think that the proposed finding

that you submitted to us is correct and it is

accurate. But I do believe that it is redundant

of the finding that we already have in 2, 3, and

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And from what I'm hearing you say, you are more concerned about the recommendation than the finding. Would you make your motion that the commission consider just the recommendation since I think there is already a factual basis in the there for a recommendation? Would you consider making the motion just to the recommendation and not the additional finding?

UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Yes, sir.

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Okay. So we have -- and you all have in front of you Sheriff Judd's motion that the additional recommendation -- and for those that don't have it I will go ahead and read it, and then see if we have a second.

It says, "Before the legislature should craft language, either specific to Broward county and the city of Hollywood or in a broader manner, which in a similar circumstance will give the Governor the authority to declare that a communications tower may be placed on any land within the state of Florida if it is in the best

1	interest of public safety, the legislative
2	language should also be crafted to ensure
3	compliance with any other existing law."
4	So that's Sheriff Judd's proposed
5	recommendation to be added to chapter 4. Is there
6	a second?
7	(MULTIPLE SPEAKERS.)
8	MS. BOOK: I will second.
9	UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Second.
LO	CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Okay. So second by
L1	Senator Book. So now, we have this set up and
12	that is the motion that has been seconded. And
L3	now, it's proper for discussion and debate. So
L 4	Sheriff Ashley, you are first. Go ahead.
L5	MR. ASHLEY: Thank you, Sheriff. I was just
L 6	curious if our legal staff could tell us if
L 7	emergency communications local communications
L8	are considered a part of state's critical
19	infrastructure?
20	CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Mr. Jones, do you want
21	to weigh in on this and answer Sheriff Ashley's
22	question and provide your prospective on this?
23	MR. JONES: Sure. Sheriff Ashley, I don't
24	know the answer to that off the top of my head.

But the concerns that we have over this are in

addition to what the Chair went over with all of the different problems with eminent domain, and taking, and county home rules. And also, they can be challenged on a constitutionality level.

So while it is true that whatever the legislature says the law is, the law is. And that's true, until someone challenges it because it violates either the Florida or U.S.

Constitution.

So I think that that's where the challenge from the locals would come from. And the way that this is currently written it's not just written to where in this situation if the tower -- there's an argument over whether it can be placed in a park because of the county's charter, this is written so that a tower can be placed anywhere on private property, on top of someone's house. So I think --

MR. ASHLEY: Right.

MR. JONES: -- that it would receive a lot of challenges the way it is currently written.

MR. ASHLEY: Well, the reason I ask is -- is if it keeps -- it would defeat -- if it's going to end up in litigation and eminent domain anyway it would defeat our purpose in trying to speed this

thing up because they are already litigating, or discussing, or negotiating trying to get this tower up. So we would just move it from one set of negotiations to another if the Governor were to declare some eminent domain and it ended up in litigation that way.

So I'm not sure -- I'm not sure in the end, that it would do what we would want it do by making this recommendation.

MR. JONES: Well, it's definitely not going to speed anything up. I mean, session starts in January, but we're not going to have anything signed into law until probably April or May. And then if it goes into effect when it's signed then the challenges are going to come. So they are just going to be locked up in some form of litigation for years.

MR. ASHLEY: I would just like the better recommendation of bringing those county commissioners and city officials before the commission and working it that way rather than asking our legislatures to do something that is not going to meet what we want -- it's not going to do what we want it to do. And so that's my point and input.

(MULTIPLE SPEAKERS.)

2	CHAIRMAN	GUALTIERI:	Go	ahead,	Sheriff	Judd.

Go ahead.

MR. JUDD: My point is, it's not that I want to do one or the other. I want to do both,

Sheriff Ashley. And lawyers are lawyers; that's what they do.

And what I want to do is -- is -- and the wording that we put in this recommendation doesn't have to be the exact wording that the legislators put in the legislation. So lawyer is a lawyer.

But I'm telling you that somebody has got to do -- take all of the proactive measures that we can to break that log jamb. And we've got to quit worrying about what the outcome maybe because if we worry about the outcome we would never pass another law because anything that you pass is subject to court scrutiny and litigation. So you know sometimes you have to damn the torpedoes at full speed ahead if you want a positive outcome -- is my point.

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: So let me just say one thing, as far as the issue of -- so we can just take this and -- and have an understanding about it, at least as far as I'm concerned is -- is that

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that I wholeheartedly concur, and adore, support, everything that I can say positively --

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MR. FOY: He is cleaning up the language.

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: -- if by the time we're ready to meet again early next year that they have not, meaning the city of Hollywood, the city --Broward county and whatever other governments, Tamarac, etc. that are involved in the land swap -- everybody else out there has not resolved this by that point of next year when we meet here, you know, the first part of next year in several months -- and I have no concern and fully support what the suggestion is and that is if we need to -- depending on the county commissioners, and city commissioners, and officials in -- and because at that point they will have had so -- so much time to get those resolved. And so there is no issue with that, as far as I'm concerned. There -- as long as the commission as a whole supports that we do it and if we need to issue subpoenas we will issue subpoenas. And so but -- let's see what they do in between now and the time we meet and if we need to we will.

And so I don't -- you know, I don't think that that really needs to have any further

discussion. We're all on the same page with that

as it really relates to this recommendation and

whether we want to -- and I hear you Sheriff Judd

-- is that -- and everything that you say is

correct. But at the same time, I also don't think

that we should be putting forth a recommendation

that, you know, on it's face has -- it has

affirmatives --

(MULTIPLE SPEAKERS.)

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: -- and that's been my concern with it and we're trying to do this here and kind of the last minute, and trying to get it right.

And this also -- keep in mind, also, this is a recommendation, just because we recommend it doesn't mean that they are going to do it. And just because we recommend it doesn't mean that we are going to do it in this fashion.

So, you know, and to the point, is that we're trying to also signal and send a message. And to the extent that that helps to move this maybe it doesn't matter that it's perfect, even though it does have affirmatives.

But I am concerned that, you know, it so broad that -- and so obvious affirmatives with it,

I also don't want our recommendations to be seen as something that we -- recommend something that is undoable and people see it on the face that it is undoable. I don't think that is good for the commission to do that. But who is next?

(MULTIPLE SPEAKERS.)

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Yes, Senator Book.

Senator Book, go ahead.

MS. BOOK: Thank you so much. And this is actually something that came up last session.

Senator Brandon from your area has that regional communications bill. And we were working on an amendment that we couldn't get on at the time that would have been a friendly amendment. It just didn't work with the timing.

And so I have a question and I think it would be very, very specifically tailored. And I just want to read it out loud because I went back and pulled it, just to kind of get your thoughts, the commission's thoughts, and Jason's thoughts -- it was in any county where the county is responsible for emergency CAD and 911 radio systems any local government zoning restrictions, land use restrictions, or restrictive covenants shall be deemed null and void for purposes of citing

towers, equipment, and any related equipment consistent with installing, upgrading, or operating emergency radio communications within that county. And we did it that way because I --you know, Broward county is responsible for protecting the community's health, safety, and welfare as you so correctly said. And that was specifically tailored. And I agree with you that this was something that was discussed. We just didn't get it on time, but I don't know if that fixes your agita with the language.

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: You know, I will tell you this is -- remember, to a degree -- but remember, the hold up now isn't any of those items that you just referenced, Senator. Is the -- the hold up now, which I don't think that you can -- as the legislature -- the legislature can address. The hold up now isn't any of the restrictive covenants and deeds -- deed restrictions, etc. They already addressed that the county commission already voted to overturn the deed restriction. The problem now is the county charter. I don't think the legislature can pass anything that overturns the county charter.

And it's the county charter that is the

- 1 problem because the county charter says that 2 "Broward county may not own county land -- a park, 3 for anything other than recreational purposes." So this is a -- the latest cog in the wheel. 4
- 5 It seems like every time you turn a corner in this 6 thing there is a new cog in the wheel. 7 everything was supposed to be resolved because the county commission by super majority, eight to nine 8 9 vote, removed the deed restriction and they got 10 the deal with Hollywood. They had a -- they agreed -- they had an agreement that they would go 11 12 with all of that. And then oh, okay, we are set 13 to go. Well, whoops. Now, we're not because 14 we've got this problem in the county charter. I don't even think that -- if we're trying to just 15 16 really fix the issue in Broward county that's not 17 going to fix it.
- 18 MS. BOOK: Got it.
- 19 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: So who else wants to 20 weigh in?
- 21 MR. BARTLETT: Commissioner Bartlett. 22 would like to weigh in.
- 23 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Go ahead, Commissioner.
- MR. BARTLETT: Precisely for what you just 24 25 said I think they made an effort to do this.

1 Hollywood actually had a deal with Broward. 2 then Broward had a problem with the park land 3 issues -- that they couldn't own that for the purposes that they were going to do it. And that 4 5 kind of put the brakes on it. And then talked 6 about Tamarac coming in -- and then, you know, 7 that was a problem because Hollywood, understandably, didn't like them owning property 8 9 within the city. But they were on a path, at least from Hollywood's perspective, they were on a 10 11 path to try to resolve this thing. So I think 12 we're -- the recommendation by the legislation is 13 kind of hard towards Hollywood in it's self as 14 suggesting that they weren't cooperating. And I 15 think they were. They were at the point -- one 16 time they thought they had a deal.

UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Correct.

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MR. BARTLETT: And secondly, I just think by making a recommendation like this we're overreaching. Really -- I mean, we're kind of taking it into the next level and it introduces all kinds of issues. So I would not agree with the recommendation.

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: That's my concern. You know, I think we're -- we've got to be careful.

You know, we all want this done. But we've got to be careful that we don't -- again, I'm concerned about sending something to the legislature that is -- anybody is going to look at and say, "Look, we can't do this and y'all should know that." I have concerns about that. But any way who wants to weigh in?

MR. BARTLETT: Bob, my last statement is, you know, when the county tried to sell the land to Tamarac in the middle of Hollywood, you know that is game playing -- that is game playing, correct.

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Correct.

MR. BARTLETT: I mean, who in their right mind would think that Hollywood should go along with that?

So Bob, my point is I don't know what their end game is or what their political game is down there. All I know is that the public and our first responders are being put at risk and somebody has got to break the log jamb. That's all I know.

So however we word it -- and I'm perfectly fine with being voted down and then we can just get in line with Broward, and Hollywood, everybody and stand around and ring our hands.

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Well, and I hear you. But remember this, too, is against this backdrop, it is on track to be better than this because Broward county is moving forward with the 15th hour and the east Hollywood hour is 16. And they say that the course that this is on will have the new system up and running by the first quarter of 2020. The only power that won't be operational is this one. And the only agency that is going to be affected by it -- directly affected by it, is the City of Hollywood Police Department. Everybody else in south Broward county will be on the new system.

And the -- they will be better, but not perfect. The only issues will be penetration issues. So -- and then once Hollywood is the only agency on the legacy system the chances of the legacy system overloading are probably, you know, nominal because they will be the only ones on it. So it is moving forward. And they are not standing -- you know, 60 days ago that would be absolutely true.

What has changed in the last 30 days or so is the county's decision to drive this forward and stand it up on the 15 and say to Hollywood, "Y'all

are the only ones that are affected by it so get

2 off the dime or not."

But I -- then you've got this whole -- it is game playing -- we're trying to -- Hollywood -- I can understand. I concur. I would be upset too if I was the city of Hollywood and the county was trying to sell park land in my city to another city on the east side of Broward county in some land-swap deal without offing it to us first, so that is all correct. But it is on the path to improvement and they have moved, somewhat. It's not just stagnant, and stale, and sitting as it was 60 days ago. So --

(MULTIPLE SPEAKERS.)

MR. BARTLETT: And that should run cold water through our veins just thinking that -- well, you know, everybody but Hollywood is okay, so --

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: And, you know -- well, you know, and the other issue that you got too with this -- you know, again, you've got the citizen groups that are involved down there. And, you know, citizen groups are as vocal on this -- and they are as prominent to debate on this as anybody.

And, you know, you get into this too where,

you know, the legislature passes a law telling the 1 2 Governor that he can do this. And the citizens, 3 as we know, in Hollywood are -- you know, citizens are adamantly opposed to it. You know, it's just 4 5 a -- it's a tough one, it's a very tough one. 6 MR. BARTLETT: You know, I -- my thing is 7 that we, you know, that I -- if we don't include this, but we give them the next, you know, 90 days 8 9 or so and see where it is and where we meet again. And then if it's not resolved then we take the 10 11 gloves off and then we pull all of the stops out 12 because that point is over the line of ridiculous. And then we -- then we start moving forward and 13 14 get aggressive with it. 15 But I think since they are making some 16 incremental changes, and it has gotten better in 17 the last 30 days, and they are trying to work it 18 out, you know, as opposed to trying to get something transferred here and craft something, 19 20 you know, at the last minute to put in the report. 21 But I absolutely hear you. And I'm as 22 frustrated as you are with it, believe me.

And in the recommendation that we just omitted that we did talk about as of the last meeting in October is from Commissioner Carroll -- and it is this, "The recommendation is that the legislature consider implementing juvenile mental health and well-being courts and provide judges with more progressive tools and consequences to better engage children in mental health treatment," so that was talked about.

And we again -- we omitted it. Commissioner Carroll caught it and he brought it to our attention. So unless, there's any objection, I'm going to go ahead and include that in chapter 12.

1 Is there any objection to that? 2 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: I like it. 3 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Okay. So without objection, we're going to add that to chapter 12. 4 5 And Commissioner Carroll that takes care of your 6 point, your concern, correct? MR. CARROLL: It does. Thank you, sir. 7 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Okay. So where we are 8 9 now is on the report that you have in front of you that -- now, again, is just subject to tweaks with 10 11 form and formatting. Is that -- do we have a 12 motion to approve the draft report with what we will add as I just mentioned -- the new finding 13 14 from Commissioner Carroll, and the language that I read previously that just passed by motion with --15 16 from chapter 4 -- from Sheriff Judd? So those --17 with those two additions, do we have a motion to 18 approve the report? 19 MR. HARPRING: Commissioner Harpring, so 20 moved. 21 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Okay. Commissioner 22 Harpring moves the approval. Do we have a second? 23 MR. JUDD: Grady Judd. UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Second. 24

17	clarify that. I found it completely upsetting
18	that two different senators would go to that
19	extent and say that if that's not true.
20	I personally took it as an affront to all of
21	the days, hours, and months that I've dedicated to
22	investigate the truth as to how and why my little
23	boy was murdered.
24	And I would like an apology from those two
25	senators that choose to be dishonest for purely

- 1 political reasons. 2 And that's all on that issue. 3 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Okay. MS. BOOK: Mr. Chair? 4 5 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Yes, Senator? 6 MS. BOOK: Senator Book, if I could --CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Sure, Senator. 7 MS. BOOK: Mr. Schachter, thank you very 8 9 much. Mr. Schachter, I want to make sure that I am very, very clear. I can't speak for any other 10 11 member of the Florida Senate. I never said, nor 12 did I suggest, that we took a vote on it. What I did say was that it was something that 13 14 was discussed at the commission meeting and that it would not have been sustained. 15 16 And I apologize if you feel that that is 17 somehow disrespectful or not a representation of 18 what you know to be true. For that, I am very sorry. But I can't speak for any other member of 19 the Florida Senate. 20 21
- 21 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: All right. Thank you,
 22 Senator. When we -- how many public comments -23 cards, do we have Jennifer?
- MS. MILLER: Just one.
- 25 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Go ahead. Okay. And

- you want to announce who the citizen is that wants
 to make a public comment?
- MS. MILLER: Okay. We're ready for Kevin
 Bolling.
- 5 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Mr. Bolling, if you are 6 on the line you have two minutes.
- MR. BOLLING: I, too, took what Senator Book

 said -- yeah, I -- I believe that the

 interpretation was with you guys for supporting

 Sheriff Scott Israel. I still don't believe that

 he should have been taken out of office because of

 the reasons that the Governor did.

I do believe that he lied on the -- I believe that he lied -- the governor's letter ten days after -- because it seems that it took you guys eight, nine months to figure out what happened.

So FDLE -- I don't know if it's even completed yet.

But with that being said, truthfulness obviously, matters. There are two paragraphs in our policy manual that talks about reporting matters correctly and truthfulness. And Sheriff Israel violated both of those; that's my first comment.

My second comment is that I'm totally

disgusted that there are people in my community
that believe that eight police officers were on
scene, heard gunshots, and are telling you that
they did not know where those gunshots were coming
from. And for some reason it keeps coming back
that one guy made a mistake or one guy didn't do
what he was -- or whatever you guys keep saying.
But there were eight deputy sheriffs on that
scene, plus Coral Springs and none of them knew
where this guy was or trust me we wouldn't be
having a trial.

Again, I don't -- I would like anybody who would challenge -- if you could give me any evidence whatsoever that anybody knew where that guy was until two minutes after he was gone. When Coral Springs lined up and took two minutes after they were told that there were victims in the 1200 Building to go into the 1200 Building -- they are our heros. They did not know where he was at. But they knew there were victims in the 1200 Building two minutes after everything was over.

So with that being said, I don't know how I can -- I've been speaking this -- I try to submit things. I've given you guys things. I've given senators things. I'm so disgusted by Senator

Book's comments on the floor that I feel that it was disrespectful to the victims. And I believe that the law enforcement community down here in Broward county -- you guys keep making it sound like it is a circus. I was a member of that team for 36 years. It has nothing to do with the policies of the sheriff's office. It has nothing to do with the cowardliness. It didn't have anything to do with guys not wanting to do their job.

I am telling you that if they would have know where the guy was they would have taken appropriate action. Again, if anybody can give me a shred of evidence that says that the Broward Sheriff's Office, eight deputies, failed to go in because they were hiding, I would love -- I would love to hear it. And I would like to hear it in writing because I'm trying --

(MULTIPLE SPEAKERS.)

CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: Wrap it up. Please, wrap it up because you've got about ten seconds.

MR. BOLLING: All right. Well, I'm going to -- like I said, I'm not sure exactly why this commission is hell bent -- I think that Mr. Pollack (PHONETICALLY) is 100 percent correct

about the change that needs to happen. I like

seeing you guys doing those changes. I appreciate

your time as public servants, but I am telling

you, you are 100 percent wrong on this thing.

(MULTIPLE SPEAKERS.)

6 MR. GUALTIERI: Thank you.

MR. BOLLING: I have no problem whatsoever with -- with him being gone. I have no problem with it at all. You're -- the guy that you put in was a sergeant --

(MULTIPLE SPEAKERS.)

MR. GUALTIERI: Mr. Bolling, you're finished.

MR. BOLLING: Again, I can't --

MR. GUALTIERI: Commission members, we will get -- we're going to go ahead and finalize the report. We will get it submitted. And I'm going to -- I've asked for a meeting with the senate president and with the speaker to discuss the recommendations, and hopefully, move down a path of what we did this past year involving something similar to Senate Bill 73 where they take these recommendations, consider them, and put them all into one bill for the upcoming legislative session.

And we will let you know more after I talk to

the president and the speaker. And we will see 1 2 where that goes. We are going to start working on 3 it and planning -- there is the follow up for next vear. And then we will have discussion about 4 5 where that next meeting will be. May be it will 6 be a telephone meeting like this after the first 7 of the year sometime just to touch base and get an idea as to where we go. But I was thinking after 8 9 the session. So maybe sometime March, April 10 timeframe for convening the next meeting. But --11 so does anybody have anything else, anything you 12 want to add, or anything anybody else wants to add 13 before we adjourn. 14 (NO RESPONSE.) 15 CHAIRMAN GUALTIERI: All right. Well, thank 16 you everybody. The meeting stands in adjournment. (WHEREUPON, THE PROCEEDINGS WERE CONCLUDED AT 17 9:15 A.M.) 18
