# History of SRO Program

- The BCPS School Resource Officer (SRO) Program began in 1985 as a pilot program with the Broward Sheriff's Office.
- The initial pilot program was instituted at six (6) middle schools
  - Crystal Lake Middle school
  - Everglades Middle School
  - Lauderhill Middle School
  - Lauderdale Lakes Middle School
  - New River Middle School
  - Parkway Middle School
- As the program proved to be successful, other law enforcement agencies joined into the partnership. The current SRO program is a collaborative effort between BCPS, municipalities, and the Broward Sheriff's Office.

### An SRO shall not function as a school

disciplinarian or security officer and shall not intervene in the normal disciplinary actions of the Participating Schools. Each assigned SRO shall act at all times within the scope of authority granted to the SRO by applicable law. Each SRO shall perform duties including, without limitation, the following:

- a) The performance of law enforcement functions within the school setting;
- b) The identification and prevention of juvenile delinquency (including substance abuse) through counseling and referral services;
- c) The enhancement of student knowledge of the law enforcement function and of the fundamental concept and structure of law;
- d) The development of positive student concepts of the law enforcement community and promotion of positive interaction and enhanced relations between students and law enforcement officers;
- e) The provision of assistance and support of crime victims (including victims of abuse) identified within the school setting;
- f) The presentation of educational programs concerning crime prevention and the rights, obligations and responsibilities of students as citizens; and
- g) The provision of assistance to SBBC in protecting and securing the school plant and its occupants.

## National Association of SROs



What are appropriate roles of school resource officers? The goals of wellfounded SRO programs include providing safe learning environments in our nation's schools, providing valuable resources to school staff members, fostering positive relationships with youth, developing strategies to resolve problems affecting youth and protecting all students, so that they can reach their fullest potentials. NASRO considers it a best practice to use a "triad concept" to define the three main roles of school resource officers: educator (i.e. guest lecturer), informal counselor/mentor, and law enforcement officer.



## SRO Agreements

### OTHER PROMINENT PROVISIONS:

2.01 <u>Term of Agreement</u> Unless terminated earlier pursuant to Section 3.05 of this Agreement, the term of this Agreement shall commence on August 14, 2017 and conclude on June 7, 2018.

2.08 <u>Payment for SRO Program Services</u> SBBC shall pay to CITY the sum of \_\_\_\_\_\_ Dollars and xx/100 Cents. [Sum of Payment equates to \$46,252 per SRO].

The CITY shall invoice SBBC for SRO services rendered under this Agreement in ten (10) monthly installments with the first invoice being delivered to SBBC in August 2017, and subsequent invoices shall be delivered to SBBC on a monthly basis, with the final invoice delivered to SBBC in May 2018....However, the CITY shall make appropriate pro rata reductions in the amount invoiced during any month in which emergency circumstances reduced the amount of SRO services provided by the CITY...

2.03 <u>Assignment of SROs</u> ... However, at the discretion of the Chief of Police, any SRO may be assigned to patrol the neighborhoods surrounding their assigned school to address school security, truancy and juvenile delinquency issues...



### Increase in BCPS Reimbursement


### **BCPS** Reimbursement





## SRO Models

- There are primarily two models currently utilized to provide SROs
- 1. The Broward Sheriff's Office and many municipal partners employ a full-time, certified law enforcement deputy/officer to serve as the SRO and fulfill the term of the SRO Agreement. During the summer, the SROs continue to work on issue impacting schools and students within their respective communities, receive professional development, and support the primary law enforcement function within their community.
- 2. Several of the municipalities choose to employ a seasonal, certified law enforcement officer to only serve as the school SRO during the term of the SRO Agreement. This is done to offset the overall cost of providing the resource.






## SB 7026 Requirements

"Any additional funds appropriated to this allocation in the 2018-2019 fiscal year to the school resource officer program established pursuant to s. 1006.12 shall be **used exclusively** for employing or contracting for school resource officers, which shall be **in addition to** the number of officers employed or contracted for in the 2017-2018 fiscal year."



### Legal Position of Sheriff's Association



" In conclusion, the Act requires the school districts, rather than sheriffs or the county commissions, to fund the SROs contemplated under the Act. To the extent that the Legislature's appropriations fall short of fully funding these officers, then the responsibility nonetheless remains with the school districts to address the shortfall."
