Potential Indicators of Terrorist Activities

What Should I Consider Suspicious?

- Unusual situations like a vehicle parked in an odd or prohibited location, or a person acquiring large quantities of materials like cell phones, radio controlled toys, timers or toxic materials.
- Unusual items left unattended like a package, backpack or luggage.
- Items that appear to contain explosive materials including items with unexplainable wires, or electronics, unusual sounds, vapors or odors.
- Suspicious persons wearing bulky clothing inconsistent with the weather.
- Damage to security devices like cameras, perimeter fencing or lighting.
- Persons expressing interest in facility layout or infrastructure or someone taking pictures or videos of a facility with no explanation.
- A pattern of false alarms requiring a law enforcement response.
- A person questioning individuals at a level beyond curiosity about security procedures, a building's purpose or shift changes.
- Prolonged observation of a building, bridge or other structure, unusual photography that arouses suspicion or extended loitering without explanation.

It is important to remember that just because someone's speech, actions, beliefs, appearance, or way of life is different, does not mean that he or she is suspicious.



What Should I Do?

- Report suspicious activity to law enforcement describing specifically what you saw, where it occurred and why it's suspicious.
- ✓ Make note of suspicious statements, people and/or vehicles.
- ✓ Report threats made verbally or on social media
- ✓ If you are a business owner, ensure property is well-lit; fire alarms and emergency communications equipment is operational.
- ✓ Train employees about what is suspicious.
- ✓ Make visitors aware by posting "If You See Something, Say Something™" signs or stickers.
- ✓ If something seems wrong, notify law enforcement authorities.

Ensuring domestic security is a community effort. By learning what to look for, you can make a positive contribution to domestic security.
