## Important Update: 2011 FDLE Statute Tables

### Executive Summary:

The 2011 Florida Statute Tables, both the Arrest and Clerk versions, have been updated and are now available on the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) website. The revised Tables contain changes made by the 2011 Florida Legislature during the Regular Session.

**All** of the new laws are on the Tables, including those that were effective on or before July 1, 2011, and those that will become effective on October 1, 2011, or on January 1, 2012. The **Effective Date column** identifies those statutory changes with an October 1 or January 1 effective date. Repealed laws have been deleted from the Arrest Statute Table but are noted on the Clerk Statute Table.

The Arrest Statute Table used by law enforcement agencies contains only the current arrestable offenses. The Clerk Statute Table used by the Clerks of Court contains the arrestable offenses in addition to statutory history, such as when a statute was repealed or renumbered. The Tables, which are in both Excel and PDF formats, may be searched or downloaded from the FDLE website ([www.fdle.state.fl.us](http://www.fdle.state.fl.us)). The Tables can be found under the A-Z Index heading in the list on the left of the FDLE website homepage. The Arrest/ Clerk Statute Table appears near the top of the index list. The web page contains all the instructions necessary to successfully search or download each version.

## Information for new users

For those of you who are new users of the FDLE Statute Tables, Arrest or Clerk, the following is a brief explanation of each of the columns used on the Tables.

Rec#: This is the FDLE record number assigned to each new entry made to the Table. Record numbers are never reused, even if an entry has been repealed or renumbered by the Legislature.

Statute: This number represents the Florida Statutes Chapter and Section.

Subsection (Subsec): This number represents a further refinement of the Chapter and Section numbers. There will not always be a subsection reference.

AON (Arrest Offense Numeric)/FCIC (Florida Crime Information Center): These numbers have been assigned to specific categories of offenses. The AON and FCIC Code numbers are identical.

Code Value: This is a very brief description of the offense category represented by an AON/FCIC Code number.

Level (Lev): **M**isdemeanor or **F**elony.

Degree (Deg): **F**irst, **S**econd, or **T**hird, depending upon the severity of the offense. Additionally, some felonies are classified as **L**ife or **C**apital. First degree is the most serious misdemeanor, and Capital is the most serious felony.

Juvenile (Juv): **J**—A juvenile who is charged with one of these offenses must be fingerprinted and the fingerprints sent to FDLE. These offenses include all felonies and a number of misdemeanors specified by the Florida Statutes. **N**—This identifies those misdemeanors for which a juvenile may be fingerprinted. These fingerprints may be forwarded to FDLE and become part of the Computerized Criminal History database.

Description: This column contains a brief description of the actual offense for which the person is being charged. Because of the Table's 46-character limit, many of the descriptions are quite abbreviated. This column also will refer you to a new section number or record number if the statutory section has been renumbered.

Changed: This column on the Tables shows the approximate date on which a change was made to the Table. Changes include additions, deletions, and corrections (no matter how minor).

Repeal: If a Table entry has been repealed by the Legislature, this column on the Clerk Statute Table shows the year of the repeal or the chapter number of the law mandating the repeal.

Effective Date: This column identifies only those 2011 laws that will become effective on October 1, 2011, or on January 1, 2012. All of the other new laws became effective on or before July 1, 2011.
