A MOTION WAS MADE, SECONDED, AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY FOR THE COMMISSION TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE AUGUST 17, 2016 MEDICAL EXAMINERS COMMISSION MEETING.

ISSUE NUMBER 1: INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

- MEC Reappointments Ms. Vickie Koenig informed the Commission that the Governor had not yet reappointed the District Medical Examiner or the Funeral Home Director positions on the MEC.
- District Medical Examiner Reappointments Ms. Koenig informed the Commission that the Governor had not yet reappointed the District Medical Examiners in Districts 8 (Alachua, Baker, Bradford, Gilchrist, Levy and Union counties), 10 (Hardee, Highlands and Polk counties), or 12 (DeSoto, Manatee and Sarasota counties). The incumbent District Medical Examiners continue to serve until reappointed or replaced by the Governor, pursuant to the Florida Constitution.
- District 14 Medical Examiner Appointment Ms. Koenig informed the Commission that the Governor's Appointments Office had not yet appointed Jay Radtke, M.D. as the District 14 Medical Examiner, serving Bay, Calhoun, Gulf, Holmes, Jackson, and Washington counties.
- Ms. Koenig informed the Commission that the following district medical examiners are up for reappointment in 2017: District 15, Michael D. Bell, M.D. (Home Rule), District 16, Thomas R. Beaver, M.D., District 17, Craig T. Mallak, M.D., J.D. (Home Rule), District 18, Sajid S. Qaiser, M.D., District 19, Roger E. Mittleman, M.D., District 20, Marta U. Coburn, M.D., District 21, Rebecca A. Hamilton, M.D., District 22, Riazul H. Imami, M.D., Ph.D., District 23, Predrag Bulic, M.D., District 24, Marie A. Herrmann, M.D., and District 25, Joshua D. Stephany, M.D. (Home Rule),

The surveys and assessments for these district medical examiners for districts 15-25 will be sent to the constituents of these districts in January 2017. Ms. Koenig indicated that surveys and assessments for the funeral homes will go out via U.S. mail, rather than electronically, due to poor responses to the electronic surveys. Electronic surveys will still go out to all other constituents for each district.

- District 11 Medical Examiner Appointment Dr. Nelson informed the Commission that Emma Lew, M.D., had been appointed as the District 11 Medical Examiner. Dr. Nelson explained that District 11 (Miami-Dade County) is a home rule district; therefore, the appointment was not subject to approval by the Commission or Governor's Office.
- 2016 Interim Drugs in Deceased Persons Report Ms. McNeil reminded the Commission and those in attendance that the data for the Interim Drugs in Deceased Persons Report is due by January 1, 2017.
- 2016 Coverdell Grant Update and Solicitations for 2017 Ms. McNeil advised the Commission that 2016 funding is expected to be awarded after the first of the year. Award letters will be sent to participating districts as soon as funds have been approved for release. As a reminder, the award period for the 2016 grant will be January 1, 2017 December 31, 2017.

Notices will be sent out in January to begin accepting 2017 funding requests. This will allow the Commission to review and approve the proposals at its February meeting prior to the solicitation close.

ISSUE NUMBER 2: UNIDENTIFIED DECEASED INITIATIVE

Ms. Jan Henderson of the Missing and Endangered Persons Information Clearinghouse (MEPIC) informed the Commission that her office will begin visiting each district medical examiner to offer help in assessing the status of that district's unidentified deceased, and to ensure that all information has been entered into NAMUS. Ms. Henderson said that while she is retiring at the end of December 2016, her replacement will conduct the visits. Dr. Nelson volunteered his office for the first visit.

Dr. Nelson asked that staff conduct a survey of the district medical examiners in order to determine if everyone is sending deceased fingerprint cards to the Quality Control Section at FDLE. He also requested that the MEPIC staff to determine if the deceased fingerprint cards that are received by FDLE are being searched against warrants and other criminal history information, and is there any manner to provide the district medical examiners with some type of verification that the cards were processed.

ISSUE NUMBER 3: HUMAN DONATION PROGRAM FOR FORENSIC RESEARCH, UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH FLORIDA

Erin Kimmerle, Ph.D. gave a brief presentation regarding her proposal for a forensic anthropology research facility. Dr. Kimmerle said that she was trying to complete a Legislative Budget Request for state funding of the project.

A MOTION WAS MADE, SECONDED, AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY FOR THE COMMISSION TO SUBMIT A LETTER OF SUPPORT FOR THE PROJECT TO THE UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH FLORIDA.

<u>ISSUE NUMBER 4: FEMORS-NATIONAL GUARD MASS CASUALTY/FATALITY EXERCISE:</u> MARCH 2017

Dr. Nelson reminded everyone of the FEMORS/National Guard Mass Casualty Exercise to be held in March, 2017 at the Dade-Collier Training and Transitional Airport (TNT), a public airport located within the Florida Everglades, 36 miles west of the central business district of Miami in Collier County. The airport is owned by Miami-Dade County and operated by the Miami-Dade Aviation Department. The airport is on the Tamiami Trail (US 41) near the border between Miami-Dade and Collier counties in central South Florida.

ISSUE NUMBER 5: RESOLUTION FOR STATE ATTORNEY ANGELA COREY, 4TH JUDICIAL CIRCUIT OF FLORIDA

Dr. Nelson read the following resolution for departing Commission member Angela Corey into the record:

ISSUE NUMBER 7: 2017 FAME EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCE

Dr. Goldberger reported that the 2017 FAME Educational Conference would be held in Orlando, Florida. The Districts 9 and 25 Medical Examiner's Office will host the 2017 conference. There is no date set at this time, but anticipate the conference will be held either the second or third week of July.

ISSUE NUMBER 8: OTHER BUSINESS

Bruce Goldberger, Ph.D. gave a presentation regarding emerging drugs in Florida, including carfentanil, U-47700, and new cathinones. He spoke briefly on the Drug Enforcement Administration's recent decision to conduct further studies on Kratom prior to possibly scheduling the drug. Dr. Goldberger anticipates that there are hundreds of deaths in Florida attributed to carfentanil, but the lack of available analytical standards is delaying the identification of the substance.

During this discussion, Dr. Nelson made request that there be better communication between FDLE's crime lab, the county crime labs, and the medical examiner toxicology labs. Dr. Nelson also suggested bringing the now defunct "Crime Laboratory Council" back as a means to aid in the discussion between the labs due to the increase in synthetic drugs nationally and in Florida.

With no further business to come before the Commission, the meeting was adjourned at 11:47 A.M.

Dear Dr. Kimmerle:

On November 17, 2016, you presented a proposal to the Medical Examiners Commission regarding a forensic training center that will be associated with the Florida Institute for Forensic Anthropology and Applied Sciences at the University of South Florida in partnership with Pasco-Hernando State College and the Pasco County Sheriff's Office.

You explained that the objective of the proposed forensic training center is to create indoor and outdoor facilities that would include laboratory space for interdisciplinary and collaborative research, education, and professional training in areas relating to human identification, facial imaging, trauma analysis, age estimation, clandestine grave search and recovery, grave excavation, and chemical isotope and elemental analysis. Through this proposal, Florida will join Tennessee and Texas as a preeminent location in the United States for forensic research, allowing for mock crime scenes and hands-on training with real life scenarios through the University of South Florida's Human Donation Program.

Florida has a unique climate and the research that this facility will provide is an opportunity to blend science and law enforcement efforts to solve cold cases and bring closure to families of missing persons. Please let me know if I can be of any assistance.

The Medical Examiners Commission is supportive of this proposal.

2017 Legislative Bills of Interest

Controlled Substances (SB 150 - Steube)

This bill creates criminal penalties for trafficking of fentanyl with minimum mandatory terms of imprisonment. It creates criminal penalties for trafficking in synthetic drugs with minimum mandatory terms of imprisonment.

Proposed effective date is October 1, 2017

Controlled Substances – Kratom (HB 183 – Jacobs/SB 424 Rouson)

This bill amends section 893.03, F.S., relating to controlled substances, and adds mitragynine or 7-hydroxymitragynine, the constituents of Kratom, to the list of controlled substances. It provides for an exception for any drug product approved by the US FDA containing these substances, and penalties.

Proposed effective date is October 1, 2016.

Drug Overdose (HB 249 - Rommel/SB 588 - Passidomo)

The treatment for an overdose of a controlled substance is required to be reported to the sheriff or chief law enforcement officer in the county within 24 hours. The report must include the date of overdose, approximate age of the individual receiving treatment, the suspected kind and amount of the controlled substance, and the approximate address of where the individual was picked up, where the overdose occurred, or where the individual resides. The general data is required to be provided to the appropriate county health department. The health departments will compose a semiannual report to the Statewide Drug Policy Advisory Council. The reports may be used for distribution of available federal, state, and private funds for local substance abuse services. A sheriff or chief law enforcement officer may designate or partner with a public organization or other agency to receive, store, and manage the reports.

Proposed effective date is October 1, 2017

Controlled Substances (HB 477 – Boyd)

This bill amends section 893.03, F.S., relating to controlled substances by adding fentanyl analogs and other synthetic opioid substitutes (including U47700) to the list of Schedule I controlled substances. It provides criminal penalties for trafficking of fentanyl with minimum mandatory terms of imprisonment. It creates criminal penalties for trafficking in synthetic drugs with minimum mandatory terms of imprisonment. It also provides that distribution of a product containing heroin, fentanyl or a fentanyl analog that results in death is considered manslaughter.

Proposed effective date is upon becoming a law.

Controlled Substances (HB 505 – Trumbull)

This bill amends s. 893.03, F.S., to specify that loflupane I 123, while a component of cocaine, is not a Schedule II substance.

Proposed effective date is July 1, 2017.

<u>Photographs, Video or Audio Recordings Depicting the Killing of a Person (HB 661 – Latvala)</u>

This bill expands the public records exemption in s. 406.136, F.S. to include any photograph, video, or audio recording held by an agency that depicts or records the killing of a person, not just a law enforcement officer acting in his or her official capacity. This essentially restores s. 406.136, F.S. to its wording prior to October 1, 2016.

Proposed effective date is October 1, 2017.

Elder Abuse Fatality Review Teams (HB 703 – Watson / SB 518 – Gibson)

This bill authorizes the establishment of elder abuse fatality review teams to review fatal and near-fatal incidents of elder abuse. Such review teams may be established at the local, regional or state level. A medical examiner is among those listed as possible members of the review team. The review teams are assigned to the Department of Children and Families for administrative purposes.

Proposed effective date is July 1, 2017.

Stroke Centers (HB 785 – Magar)

This bill directs the Agency for Health Care Administration to include hospitals meeting criteria for acute stroke ready centers on the list of stroke centers. It also creates s. 395.30381, F.S., which requires all stroke centers (acute ready, primary and comprehensive), emergency medical service providers and medical examiners to submit to the Department of Health patient quality assurance proceedings, records, or reports associated with any treatment or service provided to a person suffering a stroke. This information will be used to evaluate stroke care system effectiveness, and monitor patient outcomes.

Proposed effective date is July 1, 2017.

A bill to be entitled

An act relating to drug overdoses; providing
legislative findings and intent; creating s. 893.22,

F.S.; requiring certain persons to report controlled
substance overdoses; providing for a reporting agency
in each county; defining the term "overdose";
providing requirements for such reports; providing
immunity for persons who make such reports in good
faith; requiring sharing of data with specified
entities; providing for use of such data; requiring
maintenance of records for a specified period;
prohibiting failure to make such reports, whether by
omission or willfully; providing criminal penalties;
providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. (1) The Legislature finds that substance abuse and drug overdose is a major health problem that affects the lives of many people, multiple service systems, and leads to such profoundly disturbing consequences as permanent injury or death. Heroin, opiates, illegal drug, and accidental overdoses are a crisis and stress the financial, health care, and public safety resources because there exist no central databases that can quickly help address this problem. Quick data collection

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will allow all agencies to focus on specific age groups, areas, criminal behavior, and needed public education and prevention with the maximum utilization of resources. Further, it is the intent of the Legislature to require the collaboration of local, regional, and state agencies, service systems, and program offices to achieve the goals of chapter 893, Florida Statutes, and address the needs of the public; to establish a comprehensive system addressing the problems associated with drug overdoses; and to reduce duplicative requirements across local, county, state, and health care agencies. This act is designed to address the crisis of drug overdoses.

- (2) It is the goal of the Legislature in this act to:
- (a) Discourage substance abuse and accidental or intentional overdoses by quickly identifying the type of drug involved, whether prescription or illegal, the age of the individual involved, and the areas where drug overdoses pose a potential risk to the public, schools, workplaces, and communities.
- (b) Provide a central data point in each county so that data can be shared between the health care community and municipal, county, and state agencies to quickly identify needs and provide short and long term solutions while protecting and respecting the rights of individuals.
- (3) It is the intent of the Legislature in this act to maximize:

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- (b) The utilization of funding programs for the dissemination of available federal, state, and private funds through contractual agreements with community-based organizations or units of state or local government that deliver local substance abuse services in accordance with s. 397.321(4), Florida Statutes.
- Section 2. Section 893.22, Florida Statutes, is created to read:
- 893.22 Mandatory reporting of controlled substance overdoses.—
- (1) (a) A physician, nurse, paramedic, emergency medical technician, or health care worker, or employee thereof, and any employee of a hospital, sanatorium, or other institution or provider who knowingly attends or treats or who is requested to attend or treat an overdose of a controlled substance listed in s. 893.03, shall report, within 24 hours, such attention or treatment, or request therefor, to the sheriff or chief law enforcement officer in the county in which such attention or treatment is administered or request therefor received.
 - (b) The sheriff or chief law enforcement officer in each

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county in its discretion may designate or partner with a public organization or other agency, such as the medical examiner, to receive, store, and manage the reports and other data described in this section.

- (c) For purposes of this section, the term "overdose"

 means a condition, including, but not limited to, extreme

 physical illness, decreased level of consciousness, respiratory

 depression, coma, or death resulting from the consumption or use

 of any substance listed in 893.03 that requires medical

 attention, assistance or treatment, and clinical suspicion for

 drug overdose, such as respiratory depression, unconsciousness,

 or altered mental status, without other conditions to explain

 the clinical condition.
- (2) A person who reports an overdose of a controlled substance under this section shall include in the report:
 - (a) The date of overdose.

- (b) The approximate age of the person receiving attention or treatment.
- (c) The suspected kind and quantity of controlled substances involved in the overdose.
- (d) The approximate address of where the person was picked up, where the overdose took place, or where the person resides.
- (3) A person who makes a report under this section in good faith is not subject to civil or criminal liability for making the report.

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The sheriff or chief law enforcement officer in each county, or other organization or agency as designated by such officer pursuant to subsection (1), shall share the general data, excluding any data relating to a criminal charge, with health care professionals and the county health department. Each county health department shall make a semiannual report to the Statewide Drug Policy Advisory Council in accordance with a schedule set by the council summarizing the data for that county. The council may use the reports to maximize the utilization of funding programs for the dissemination of available federal, state, and private funds for local substance abuse services in accordance with s. 397.321(4). The sheriff or chief law enforcement officer in each county, or other organization or agency designated pursuant to subsection (1), shall maintain the records described in this section. Such records shall be kept and made available for a period of not less than 5 years for inspection and copying by law enforcement officers whose duty it is to enforce the laws of this state relating to controlled substances. Law enforcement officers are not required to obtain a subpoena, court order, or search warrant in order to obtain access to copies of such records. (6) A person who: Fails by omission to report the treatment of a drug

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overdose of a substance listed in s. 893.03 within 24 hours

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 395.3038, Florida Statutes, is amended Section 1. to read:

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State-listed primary stroke centers and 395.3038 comprehensive stroke centers; notification of hospitals.-

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The agency shall make available on its website and to the department a list of the name and address of each hospital

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that meets the criteria for <u>an acute stroke ready center</u>, a primary stroke center, <u>or</u> and the name and address of each hospital that meets the criteria for a comprehensive stroke center. The list of primary and comprehensive stroke centers must include only those hospitals that attest in an affidavit submitted to the agency that the hospital meets the named criteria, or those hospitals that attest in an affidavit submitted to the agency that the hospital is certified as <u>an acute stroke ready center</u>, a primary <u>stroke center</u>, or a comprehensive stroke center by <u>a nationally recognized an accrediting organization.</u>

- (2) (a) If a hospital no longer chooses to meet the criteria for an acute stroke ready center, a primary stroke center, or a comprehensive stroke center, the hospital shall notify the agency and the agency shall immediately remove the hospital from the list of stroke centers.
- (b)1. This subsection does not apply if the hospital is unable to provide stroke treatment services for a period of time not to exceed 2 months. The hospital shall immediately notify all local emergency medical services providers when the temporary unavailability of stroke treatment services begins and when the services resume.
- 2. If stroke treatment services are unavailable for more than 2 months, the agency shall remove the hospital from the list of primary or comprehensive stroke centers until the

hospital notifies the agency that stroke treatment services have been resumed.

- (3) The agency shall adopt by rule criteria for an acute stroke ready center, a primary stroke center, and a comprehensive stroke center which are substantially similar to the certification standards for the same categories of primary stroke centers of a nationally recognized accrediting organization the Joint Commission.
- (4) The agency shall adopt by rule criteria for a comprehensive stroke center. However, if the Joint Commission establishes criteria for a comprehensive stroke center, agency rules shall be substantially similar.
- (4)(5) This act is not a medical practice guideline and may not be used to restrict the authority of a hospital to provide services for which it is licensed under chapter 395. The Legislature intends that all patients be treated individually based on each patient's needs and circumstances.
- (5) The agency shall adopt by rule standardized electronic forms for each acute stroke ready center, primary stroke center, and comprehensive stroke center to report to the department such information as required in s. 395.30381.
- Section 2. Section 395.30381, Florida Statutes, is created to read:
 - 395.30381 Statewide stroke registry.-
 - (1) Each acute ready stroke center, primary stroke center,

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comprehensive stroke center, emergency medical service provider, and medical examiner shall submit to the department patient care quality assurance proceedings, records, or reports associated with any treatment or service provided to a person suffering a stroke. Such information shall be used to evaluate stroke care system effectiveness, ensure compliance with standards established pursuant to s. 395.3038, and monitor patient outcomes.

- registry to ensure that patient care quality assurance proceedings, records, and reports required to be submitted under subsection (1) are maintained and available for use to improve or modify the stroke care system, ensure compliance with standards, and monitor stroke patient outcomes. The department may contract with a private entity to establish and maintain the registry. No liability of any kind or character for damages or other relief shall arise or be enforced against any acute ready stroke center, primary stroke center, comprehensive stroke center, emergency medical service provider, or medical examiner by reason of having provided such information to the department.
- (3) The department shall adopt rules to administer this section.

Section 3. Subsections (1), (2), and (4) of section 395.3041, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

395.3041 Emergency medical services providers; triage and

transportation of stroke victims to a stroke center.-

- (1) By June 1 of each year, the department shall send the list of <u>acute stroke ready centers</u>, primary stroke centers, and comprehensive stroke centers to the medical director of each licensed emergency medical services provider in this state.
- (2) The department shall develop a sample stroke-triage assessment tool. The department must post this sample assessment tool on its website and provide a copy of the assessment tool to each licensed emergency medical services provider no later than June 1, 2005. Each licensed emergency medical services provider must use a stroke-triage assessment tool that is substantially similar to the sample stroke-triage assessment tool provided by the department.
- (4) Each emergency medical services provider licensed under chapter 401 must comply with all sections of this act $\frac{by}{July}$ 1, 2005.

11G-5.003 District Medical Examiner Terms of Office.

The term of office for a district medical examiner appointed by the governor shall be three years. A gubernatorial appointment to fill a vacancy shall be for the unexpired portion of the term. For the purpose of administration, the 24 district medical examiners serve staggered terms, in accord with the following rotation:

- (1) First year Districts 1 through 7;
- (2) Second year Districts 8 through 14;
- (3) Third year Districts 15 through 24.

11G-5.004 Process for District Medical Examiner Candidate Nomination to the Governor.

(1) Policy Statement. Nominations for appointment as a district medical examiner shall be made only after solicitation of comments from city, county and state officials as well as from directors of funeral homes. Candidates nominated by the Medical Examiners Commission will be submitted to the Governor within 30 days after the Commission has voted on the matter. It is not the intent of the Commission to serve as the primary recruiting source for district medical examiner candidates, rather, the Commission

intends that this responsibility should remain primarily within the district. The Commission will provide a medical examiner member of the Commission to participate in the candidate screening process at the district level.

- (2) Procedure for Nomination for Reappointment of District Medical Examiners.
- (a) Prior to the expiration of each incumbent district medical examiner's three year term of appointment, the Medical Examiners Commission staff shall survey by written correspondence the district's state attorney(s), public defender(s), sheriff(s), police chief(s), county commissioner(s), funeral home directors and a member of the local medical community. The survey will solicit input from each relevant to performance of the incumbent district medical examiner and ask for a "favorable" or "non-favorable" response regarding nomination for reappointment. Additionally, the survey will ask for suggestions for improving district medical examiner services. The survey shall request recommendations for the nomination of the incumbent or any other qualified candidate(s) to serve as district medical examiner.
- (b) A summary of the survey results shall be provided to the Commission. Copies of the survey responses shall be forwarded to the incumbent district medical examiner by Commission staff. The incumbent, together with any other qualified candidates named in the survey responses, shall be notified in writing as to the date, time and place of the Commission meeting which will be considering the reappointment of the district medical examiner.
- (c) The Commission chairman may request establishment of a committee, as referred to in paragraph 11G-5.004(3)(b), F.A.C., to address concerns regarding the incumbent district medical examiner raised in the survey responses or to initiate a search for other candidates for nomination by the Commission.
 - (3) Procedure to fill a District Medical Examiner Vacancy.
- (a) The Governor will be notified by the Commission upon determination that a district medical examiner position has become vacant or is anticipated to become vacant. The Commission shall also notify the respective state attorney(s), public defender(s), sheriff(s), police chief(s), county commission(s) and funeral home directors for that medical examiner district, requesting that names of potential candidates for the position of district medical examiner be submitted to the candidate search committee established in paragarph 11G-5.004(3)(b), F.A.C.
- (b) Within 30 days of being notified of a vacancy or anticipated vacancy, the Chairman of the Commission shall call for a district candidate search committee to be established and appoint a chairman. The search committee shall consist of invited representatives from the offices of the state attorney(s), public defender(s), sheriff(s), police chief(s), county commission(s), funeral homes and a representative of the local medical community from within the bounds of that particular medical examiner district and a physician member of the Medical Examiners Commission or other medical examiner designated by the Chairman. The search committee shall be requested to:
- 1. Seek applications from interested candidates who are licensed physicians and experienced practitioners of pathology who possess qualifications to take the examination or already possess the primary certification offered by the American Board of Pathology, American Osteopathic Board of Pathology, or equal qualification rendered by a non-United States medical specialty certifying agency.
- 2. Establish an interview team, which shall have a quorum of three participants, to interview interested candidates meeting minimum position qualifications. If the district includes a medical school, the dean of the medical school should be invited to participate as a member of the interview team.
- 3. Assure that the candidate(s) recommended to the Commission for nomination as district medical examiner is in agreement with the respective county representatives regarding the medical examiner budget as outlined in Section 406.06(3), F.S.
- 4. Review background information about the final candidate(s) from present and past sources, to include a criminal history check, comments of county medical associations, employment references, local hospitals, government agencies and funeral homes with which the candidate(s) has a prior working relationship. Background inquiries should incorporate information on work performance and working relationships, as well as the candidate(s) reasons for and circumstances of leaving employment.
- 5. Submit an interview package to the Medical Examiners Commission staff for each candidate recommended to the Commission for nomination consisting of: pertinent correspondence regarding the candidate(s); results of background inquiries; letters of reference; and a letter from the candidate(s) to the Commission staff authorizing the release of information from former employers and the Board of Medicine in the state in which the candidate(s) is or was licensed.
- 6. Complete the candidate selection and interview process and submit interview packages to the Commission within 90 days of appointment of the candidate search committee unless additional time is requested in writing and approved by the Commission Chairman.

- (c) The Commission staff shall review interview packages for completeness, prior to their being submitted to the Medical Examiners Commission and, if directed by the Chairman, make additional inquiries concerning the candidate's background or qualification.
 - 1. The Commission staff shall verify each candidate's medical licensure status.
- 2. The Commission staff shall notify all candidates in writing of the time and place of the Commission meeting at which the district nomination(s) will be considered.
- (d) The Commission, by majority vote, shall nominate one or more candidates to the Governor, to fill a district medical examiner office vacancy prior to the expiration of six months from the date of the vacancy. Nothing herein is intended to restrict the Commission's consideration of candidates for nomination only to those persons who may be recommended by a candidate search committee.
- (e) The Commission will notify each candidate in writing as to the action taken by the Commission regarding their nomination as district medical examiner.
- (f) The Commission will notify the chairman of the candidate search committee in writing on action taken by the commission regarding candidates submitted by the district to fill a district medical examiner vacancy. If the Commission does not vote to nominate any of the candidates submitted by the candidate search committee, the chairman of the committee may be requested to submit other candidates. The Office of the Governor will be notified that none of the candidates submitted for that district were acceptable and that the position is still vacant.

Probationary Case File Audit – Final Order against Sajid S. Qaiser, M.D.

On July 7, 2016, the Medical Examiners Commission filed a final order on MEC case #15-1 regarding the McDonough complaint. The final order provided that Sajid S. Qaiser, M.D., be placed on one year of probation, to include the drafting of new office policies and procedures. The Commission included a provision that MEC staff shall conduct a second audit in order to determine that new policies have been put in place and are being followed and if so, the Commission may terminate the period of probation early.

On December 12, 2016, the District 18 Medical Examiner's Office was notified that Commission staff would conduct an audit of all files for calendar year 2016 for cases in which jurisdiction was accepted, but a visual inspection rather than an invasive autopsy was conducted. The audit was scheduled for January 12-13, 2017, and advanced notice was provided to allow the office to pull the files for review.

From January 12-13, 2017, staff members Doug Culbertson, Beth McNeil, and I reviewed 212 visual inspection case files for the 2016 calendar year. In each of these cases, it was evident that the new policies and procedures were in effect and being followed. All case files contained the pertinent medical records to support the findings of the cause and manner of death for each visual external examination conducted. If required, toxicology reports for ante-mortem blood (hospital admit) or post-mortem blood or vitreous were present in the case file. Each of the toxicology reports included a request for quantification of toxicology results and payment for such requests was made by the District 18 Medical Examiner's Office.

Based on the results of this audit, staff finds that Sajid S. Qaiser, M.D., has complied with the terms of his probation to date. The documentation contained within the case files indicates that new office policies and procedures are in place and being followed.
